



50 YEARS AGO

Friday, January 18, 1963

- The vote by Yankton Chamber of Commerce members was 2 to 1 in favor of daylight saving time, it was reported at the Chamber board luncheon meeting held Thursday noon at Kip's Inn with President Ed Vinatieri in charge. Accordingly the board passed a resolution urging adoption of daylight saving time throughout South Dakota.

25 YEARS AGO

Monday, January 18, 1988

- For the second night in a row, when it came to "crunch time" the Yankton Bucks did not have the bite to keep with their opponent, and thus fell victim in another overtime loss. This time the Bucks came out on the short end 64-59 against Sioux City West.

for any changes in higher education goals. The council would not manage the schools, so the Board of Regents would continue to manage universities and the state Board of Education would continue to oversee the technical schools, Perry said.


Regents officials have said the universities have been hurt in the past 12 years by a lack of funding increases to keep up with inflation. At the same time, enrollment has grown by 8,000 students, they said.

The bill's funding framework originally included the four technical schools, but the committee changed the measure so the funding proposal only deals with universities.

Dick Tieszen, a Pierre lawyer who represents the technical schools, said funding for the institutes should not be tied to overall enrollment increases because the schools have to frequently adjust enrollment in particular courses to meet the needs of employers.

The Senate committee also approved a bill that would require the state Labor Department to report job placements for university graduates. Under another bill passed by the committee, state agencies would have to report how university graduates perform on licensing or certification examinations.

ServSafe Recertification In Armour Feb. 26

BROOKINGS — SDSU Extension hosts a ServSafe Foodservice Manager Sanitation Recertification Course Feb. 26 in Armour at the 4-H Building, 39182 280th St., Armour. The recertification course begins at 12:15 with registration and ends at 4:30 p.m. with an assessment. Pre-registration is required by Feb. 12.
"South Dakota food service establishments are required to have at least one person on staff that has passed an approved eight-hour food service manager sanitation training and certification program. ServSafe is an approved course," said Lavonne Meyer, Extension Food Safety Specialist, Certified ServSafe Instructor.
She adds that law requires that this certificate needs to be renewed every five years. This class meets the requirements of South Dakota Department of Health Standards.
Class size is limited and registration for the event is required. Attendees are required to bring a photo ID, and encouraged to bring note taking materials as well as the meat thermometer. All other written materials will be provided at the class.
Meyer encourages all individuals involved in food service of any kind to participate.
