Wayne State To Host Nebraska Science Bowl

WAYNE, Neb. — Wayne State College (WSC) is helping to sponsor the 19th annual Nebraska High School Science Bowl and the 10th annual Nebraska Middle School Science Bowl, to be held on Feb. 2 and Jan. 26, respectively, at Wayne State College in Wayne, Neb. Sixty-six teams from schools across Nebraska will participate at the events.

Each team is made up of four students, one alternate and a teacher serving as coach. Teams have to be quick and have a vast knowledge of astronomy, biology, computer science, physics, chemistry, math and earth sciences. Teams compete by answering questions in a round-robin and then a double elimination tournament.

Organizations sponsoring the Nebraska Science Bowl events include: Central Platte Natural Resources District, Lower Platte South Natural Resources District, Nebraska Department of Education, Nebraska Public Power District, Papio-Missouri River Natural Resources District, U.S. Department of Energy, Otte Construction, RDG Geoscience and Engineering, and Wayne State College.

This year teams of young scientists from all over Nebraska gather at Wayne State College for

the annual Nebraska Science Bowl. The last Saturday in January finds Wayne State College filled with middle school teams and coaches. The very next Saturday the same venue hosts the high school students and coaches. The competition is fun, fast-paced, and intense as the winning team at each level will receive an all expense paid trip to the National Science Bowl® in Washington D. C. later in 2013.

The goal of the Nebraska Science Bowl as well as the National Science Bowl® is to encourage students to excel in science and mathematics. Many of these students will continue their education beyond high school and will have a career in an area of science or mathematics.

The opening ceremony will begin at 9 a.m., followed by a round robin competition from 9:30 a.m.-noon, involving all of the teams in the four divisions; each division has ten teams. The top four teams in each division will then advance to the double elimination competition, beginning at 1 p.m. Medals will be awarded to the top 4 teams at each event.

Teams are as diverse as our schools and consist of four student contestants, an alternate

student contestant and a team coach who is most often a teacher. To answer questions during the competition, students must have an in-depth knowledge of many areas of science and mathematics. The questions come in pairs: toss up questions and bonus questions. Contestants on both teams have an equal opportunity to answer toss up questions by pressing a buzzer when they have an answer. No conferring among team members is permitted on toss up questions. Answering a toss up question correctly permits that team to then work together to answer a bonus question. The competition is fun, fast-paced, and intense as teams vie for a single invitation to attend the National Science Bowl®. High school students are quizzed on biology, chemistry, physics, astronomy, earth science, general science, and math. Middle school students are quizzed on a variety of disciplines including earth, physical, life and general science and math.

and we would be adding vehicles, carts and we'd also be remodeling the Vermillion recycling center to be able to handle it."

A new processing line would be needed to accommodate the additional recyclables, along with some new vehicles.

The total net additional costs on an annual basis would be about \$128,000 per year, or \$1.42 per household per month.

"Option three is adding the single-stream to both cities and then consolidating all the collectibles at the Vermillion site and transporting them to a different site for separation, sorting and selling," Iverson stated. "There would also have to be some remodeling done at the Vermillion recycling center."

Because the sorting would occur elsewhere, a new processing line would not be needed as with option two. New vehicles would also be needed in this scenario.

The additional costs for option three would vary depending on the amount the recycler either

pays or charges to process the recyclables. It could be as low as \$3.32 per household per month to as high as \$4.60.

However, a representative of a Sioux Falls recycling facility informed the commission that the Joint Powers should not be charged to have its recyclables processed. Shaun Feilmeier, the public relations director at Millennium Recycling and a Yankton native, said his firm does not charge to take in recyclable products.

"Option four is where we would hire a private operator to provide single-stream collection," Iverson said. "We wouldn't have to remodel anything. We wouldn't have to buy anything. What you would have to do is hire a private company to come in and meet our needs. They would have to take the materials we define they should be taking. The company could charge between \$3 and \$5 per household. That's an estimate."

"Some of the advantages of this is, you would limit the day-to-day activities needed by the cities, and you would take the risk of market fluctuations out of it," he continued. "Disadvantages would be that you lose day-to-day control over operations. You would likely need to still handle the calls and complaints from citizens regarding the recycling program. You might have to handle bill collection and would

have to monitor the private collector at some level."

Assuming private collection and processing could be attained for \$4 per household per month, the cities could save approximately 65 cents per household per month for their curbside collection — assuming Yankton's recycling collection cost was \$3.30 per household per month like it is in Vermillion.

Vicki Haddock with Waste Connections shared the experience her hauling company has had with recycling. The firm was recently contracted by Crofton, Neb., and Winside, Neb., to provide curbside services. Waste Connections sells its recyclables to Millenium Recycling.

Because of the amount of products Millenium can accept, Haddock said her company's customers can recycle up to 70 percent of their trash.

"You're going to have some who take advantage of that fully and some who don't," she stated. "What we find is, when residents start recycling, where they may have had a full 96-gallon cart's worth of trash each week, they now have one or two bags. It's really the recycling container that is full and overflowing."

After an hour of discussion, the city directed its representatives on the Joint Powers board to

recommend an option that would provide single-stream recycling.

"I think we definitely have a consensus that we like the idea of single-stream, but how we handle it once it leaves our curbs is what is yet to be decided," Mayor Nancy Wenande said.

Commissioner David Carda, a city representative on the Joint Powers board, said the organization will have to look at the big picture of the solid waste system and come back to its members with a recommendation.

Commissioners also requested a spread sheet that more clearly defines the additional costs and revenues associated with each option. They felt the figures provided in the current HDR study format were confusing.

The Joint Powers board is set to meet later this month to discuss the HDR report and how to proceed.
