to deal with that."

Because of DAR's efforts, Brasel, who also serves as the animal control officer for the Yankton Police Department, said only three dogs were euthanized by the city in 2012. In those cases, the dogs were either too sick or aggressive to be placed with a family, she stated.

DAR couldn't have accomplished all it did without the assistance of volunteers to foster the dogs, walk them and provide financial assistance. Local veterinarians and businesses also played a large role in providing health care, money and equip-

she hit him on the back. The infant later died.

Jones' attorney, Stuart J. Dornan, told The Associated Press that his client will plead not guilty. Dornan said Jones was released from jail after a judge reduced her bond from \$500,000 to \$100,000. A preliminary hearing is scheduled for March 21.

The manslaughter charge "was a shock to her," Dornan said.

Investigators say Jones was ordered to stop practicing medicine in Nebraska without a license in 1999, and there are no records that she ever applied for a license. South Dakota authorities issued a similar order.

#### Farber Statue Is Backdrop For USD Fundraiser

VERMILLION — For \$15, students, faculty, alumni and friends of the University of South Dakota can enjoy a fun way to keep track of 2013 through the eyes of a unique campus landmark.

The University of South Dakota Mock Trial Team's William O. "Doc" Farber 2013 Statue Calendar shows photos of the Farber statue in unique situations and clothing, including Valentine's Day flair or highlighting USD's rivalry with South Dakota State University. The calendar was created by USD Creative Services and student members of the mock trial team, who spent time last fall preparing the props and taking photos of the decorated statue. All proceeds from calendar sales will be used to support a scholarship for a USD Mock Trial student.

Farber, who died March 24, 2007, at age 96, served as chairman of the USD Department of Political Science for 38 years. He retired from teaching at USD full-time in 1976 but devoted most of his life to public service. In 1951, Farber established the state's Legislative Research Council to provide state legislators access to unbiased research and information on important topics. The life-sized statue of Farber, located on the terrace of Dakota Hall, was dedicated on campus in 2002 in recognition of his lifelong leadership and accomplishments for both USD and the state.




