Parkston Native Muntefering Finds A Home At Colorado State

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second of three stories from Press & Dakotan sports editor James D. Cimburek's trip to Colorado State University in Fort Collins, Colo.

FORT COLLINS, Colo. - Parkston native Alex Muntefering would be the first to tell you that his first season of competition for Colorado State did not go as planned.

This school year, though, he's

more than making up for it. Muntefering enters his junior track and field season after a cross country season in which he led the Rams in all five of their races, including a top-five finish in the Mountain West Conference.

The former state track and cross country champion in South Dakota started his collegiate career at the University of Oklahoma where, despite earning all-Big 12 academic honors, he didn't feel comfortable.

"It didn't feel quite right at OU," he said. "I came here, and it feels like I have found a home. That's what you want when you are looking for a college."

Muntefering headed west to Fort Collins, drawn by some of the same things that have made the city popular with cyclists and triathletes, as well as distance runners.

'There are a lot of endurance athletes here, between cyclists, triathletes, runners," he said. "It's probably one of the best altitudes to train at. It's one of the ideal places to train.

In his first season of competition for CSU, Muntefering finished in the top-five for the Rams three of his final four races, including placing third among the CSU runners at the Roy Griak Invitational. In track, he helped the Rams' distance med-ley relay earn all-MWC honors.

"I can't deny that last year was very hard," he said. "It was the first time in my career that I took a step

His coach, though, blames the slip in performance on getting used to the mountains.

"It took him a little time to get used to training at altitude," said Art Siemers, CSU's head cross country and assistant track coach. "This year he's broken through."

Muntefering led the Rams in all five of his races this season, including two top-five finishes: The Colorado State Open (3rd) and the MWC (5th). He finished 79th in the NCAA Regional.

And, while Muntefering has enjoyed great success in cross country, his first love has always been

"I enjoy cross country," he said. "But track is by far my focus." Siemers also likes what Muntefering can do on the track
