# S. Dakota Legislature: What To Know This Week

PIERRE — South Dakota lawmakers are set to discuss economic development incentives, university budgets and a plan to end lawsuits seeking damages from people who allegedly steal spouses. Here are five things to know heading into the session's fourth week:

## ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT INCENTIVES

Gov. Dennis Daugaard and legislative leaders are looking to find a new way to provide financial incentives that would help recruit new large industrial projects to South Dakota.

An old program that refunded construction taxes for big industrial projects expired Dec. 31, and voters in November rejected the governor's proposed replacement plan to use tax money to give grants to projects that would not locate in the state without the financial incentives.

The House State Affairs Committee will have a hearing Monday on a measure to refund city sales taxes on some projects and also give those projects a state grant. That bill is sponsored by Republican and Democratic leaders from both the House and Senate.

Another bill has been introduced that would refund construction taxes for wind energy projects.

## HIGHER EDUCATION BUDGET

The Legislature's Joint Appropriations Committee will have hearings Monday and Tuesday to begin looking at next year's proposed spending for the state's universities.

The governor has recommended an increase of about \$5.3 million in general state funds for higher education, with \$1.9 million of that to establish a doctoral degree program in physics at the University of South Dakota and the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology.

Another \$1 million would be added to increase research at the Agricultural Experiment Station. A \$100,000 increase would fund the Opportunity Scholarship, which offers \$5,000 over four years to students who take advanced courses in high school, have a good score on college entrance tests and attend a college or university in the state. The universities also would get extra money for utilities and maintenance and repair of buildings.

## ALIENATION OF AFFECTION

The Senate Judiciary Committee will hear testimony Tuesday on a bill that would get rid of a law that allows people to file lawsuits seeking financial damages from those who allegedly seduce and steal their spouses.

The same measure has failed in recent years

after supporters said alienation-of-affection lawsuits should be allowed because such legal actions can help protect marriages.

The bill is sponsored by Sen. Stan Adelstein, R-Rapid City, who has argued that the law mistakenly treats spouses as property that carry monetary value.

## GUNS IN PARKING LOTS

The House Commerce Committee on Monday is looking at a bill that would stop businesses and employers from prohibiting people to have guns or ammunition in parking lots.

The measure, sponsored by Rep. Lance Russell, R-Hot Springs, would allow guns and ammunition in parking lots if they are locked out of sight in a vehicle.

## INSIDER INSIGHT: MANY DEFERRALS ARE PERMANENT

Visitors to the Capitol or those who listen to committee hearings on the Internet may wonder why so many bills get deferred to the 41st legislative day. That's really a way to kill a bill because there is no 41st day in the legislative session.

This year's legislative session is scheduled to go only 38 days, and no session is supposed to exceed 40 days.

# Nebraska Clinics See Changes In Wake Of Prenatal Law

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Six months after Nebraska restored prenatal care services to low-income pregnant women after a bitter fight over benefits for illegal immigrants, health clinics are reporting an uptick in the percentage of women seeking medical care in the crucial first trimester of pregnancy.

The percentage of pregnant woman who seek first-trimester care during their first visit to the OneWorld Community Health Center in Omaha has increased from an average of 78 percent before the coverage was available to 85 percent in the last four months of 2012. The remainder seeks care during later stages of pregnancy.

"In terms of coverage, it has made a huge difference in our ability to reach women in that first trimester," said Dr. Kristine McVea, the center's chief medical officer. "When there was no Medicaid coverage, we had a problem with women not only seeking care late in their pregnancy,

but also skipping appointments. They couldn't afford it."

Restoring state-funded prenatal care services was one of the most emotionally charged debates for Nebraska lawmakers last year. The women were disqualified from Medicaid coverage in 2010.

Senators narrowly overrode Gov. Dave Heineman's veto, 30-16, and reinstated the benefit for low-income women, many of whom were illegal immigrants. Heineman was so angry that he later said lawmakers didn't deserve a pay raise that was set to appear on the November ballot.

The issue also divided lawmakers who argued that the issue was foremost about unborn children, who have no immigration status, and those who cast it as a tax giveaway to illegal immigrants. The proposal was backed by a coalition of religious, anti-abortion and health groups.

Lawmakers will consider another effort to end the program this session.

workers and lifting caps on legal immigration for the immediate family members of U.S. citizens.

In an opinion piece published online Sunday in the Las Vegas Review-Journal, Sen. Marco Rubio, also a member of the bipartisan Senate group, laid out his proposal to address the issue. The Florida Republican, son of Cuban immigrants, wrote that "significant progress" on enforcing immigration laws must be certified before unauthorized immigrants now in the country are allowed to apply for residency and "get in the back of the line."

Rep. Paul Ryan, the 2012 Republican candidate for vice president, said he backs Rubio's proposal.

"Immigration is a good thing. We're here because of immigration. We need to make sure it works," Wisconsin's Ryan said.

If Republicans fail to act, they will pay the price in elections for generations, McCain warned.

"Well, I'll give you a little straight talk: Look at the last election... We are losing dramatically the Hispanic vote, which we think should be ours for a variety of reasons," McCain said.

"The whole point is to create an awareness of raptors and an appreciation of what they do," she said. "If you encounter them, you need to realize they're not tame animals."

## Lawmakers To Hear Social Media Bill

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Lawmakers have set a hearing for a bill that would prevent bosses from demanding access to private information within their employees' Facebook or Twitter accounts.

The Legislature's Business and Labor Committee will hold a hearing on the proposal on Monday.

The bill by Sen. Tyson Larson of O'Neill would make it illegal for employers or potential employers to request the information from a worker or job applicant.

The bill would prevent employers from ordering a worker to log onto a social media site in the employer's presence.

Employers also would be banned from demanding passwords, or accessing an account indirectly through a friend or third party.

The law would not apply to information posted by employees that's in the public domain.

## Calif. Drive Provides Coats For S.D. Kids

PINE RIDGE (AP) — Officials on a South Dakota Indian Reservation say a campaign led by an 11-year-old California boy has resulted in the delivery of about 150 winter coats for kids.

KELO-TV reports that the Burbank, Calif., youngster started coat drive after seeing video footage about conditions on the Pine Ridge reservation. The coats were delivered last week.

Tribal Family Developer Annabelle Black Bear says the warm clothes are much needed, especially for older children on the reservation.

She says some of the kids have been walking around wearing hoodies.

Black Bear says the gesture has provided people on the reservation with hope.

"We need to see the world through a child's eyes sometimes," she says.
