# MMC Dining Hall Undergoing Work

The dining hall at Mount Marty College will see a major facelift. The entire front part of the serving line will be reconfigured. The new layout will offer multiple hot and cold wells, a pizza area, an Asian wok cooking area as well as a new griddle.

The main dining room will get an aesthetic makeover with new décor, banquet quality tables and chairs, new paint and decorations along the walls. The dining room will also feature new counter areas for the drink and

dessert areas.

Work on the project is being completed by Laurie Bailey, Welf Construction — with supervision by Kevin Bender, and Premier Restaurants from Minneapolis is completing the serving counter and equipment.

"This remodel is a great cause of excitement at MMC," stated acting Director of Facilities at Mount Marty Wyatt Yager. "The students won't recognize the space once the transformation is complete. It will streamline

our processes and increase the efficiency of serving meals — something that the students will appreciate on a day to day basis."

The projected cost of the dining hall remodel is roughly \$325,000.00 and is anticipated to be completed by Feb. 18. Until the project is completed the students will still be able to dine in the current dining hall with family style buffets as the method of food delivery.

Southeast Job Link has received a Yankton Area Community Foundation Grant Award, totaling \$3,000 to support technology upgrades for enhanced computer training opportunities and to meet the requirements needed for the new GED® computer-based testing program.

The grant will be used to equip a technology lab with computer systems that will accommodate computer-based testing needs as a result of recent changes in GED® testing and that will respond to needs for technology education from several areas of the community. Dr. Wayne Kindie, Yankton Area Foundation president, presented the check and stated "The Yankton Area Foundation understands the importance of students having an opportunity to obtain their GED and knows the significant impact this grant will have in helping students further their educational goals."

Sheri Duke, executive director of Southeast Job Link, who received the check, stated, "We are so very pleased and thankful of the support offered by the Yankton Area Community Foundation, which will allow us to better serve our community and support participants in their educational and literacy needs. Southeast Job Link was asked this fall to take part in a pilot program to offer GED® computer-based testing, which will be the only way testing is offered effective in January 2014. We were happy to jump on board, but as we began to get the process rolling, we found out that many of the computer systems we had in house did not meet the spec requirements needed for testing purposes. Currently we can only test two candidates at a time. Being able to upgrade our technology will not only allow us to test a greater number of individuals, but will also permit us to offer upgraded computer training options."

The GED® test is changing to help more adults become career and college ready; setting sights on the 39 million adults nationwide without a high school diploma.

ble expenses are broad. She was not present Monday night and Commissioner Jake Hoffner was selected to serve as the temporary mayor.

"That was intentional so the committee has the ability, once the money is collected, to focus on an area they see fit," Wenande stated Friday. "Over time, some of those interests may change depending on what project they choose to support with those funds."

She also said Friday that the KOA Campground on the east side of Yankton is expected to opt in to the BID.

The tax will go into effect April 1 and the first revenues will be collected in May. The city will collect a 2 percent administration fee for handling the funds on behalf of the BID board.

Commissioner Craig Sommer, who is a member of the board, thanked those involved with the process.

"I'm sure everyone on the board would agree it took a little longer ... than we originally planned," he said of the year-long process since the BID board first met. "The main thing is, we got it done. It's a new source of funding that doesn't really affect people who live in Yankton. It will allow us to do more things for the community than we have in the past."

The ordinance was passed in an 8-0 vote.

In other business Monday, the Commission approved utilizing voting centers in its upcoming April election.

Yankton County first used voting centers during last year's general election, and the city will now adopt the same model.

The centers will allow voters to use any polling location in the city and not restrict them to voting within a precinct. The centers will be located at JoDean's, City Hall and the Yankton County 4-H facility.

Also Monday, City Manager Amy Nelson reminded citizens that they can only sign three nominating petitions for candidates in the municipal election, which is the number of open seats on the Commission.

"The Department of Equalization began checking and discovered it wasn't their problem. They could see where things had been coded in wrong after the information was sent to the Auditor's Office and caused things not to balance out

— in simplistic terms. Essentially, it came down to the Yankton Fire District being assessed twice. That fire district was being overtaxed by \$15,000 in the reports submitted."

Moore expressed hope that the issue would be resolved quickly.
