Measure Would Allow Armed Staff In Schools

PIERRE — A bill that would allow school districts to arm teachers and other personnel with guns was approved Tuesday by the South Dakota House after supporters said it could make would-be attackers think twice about entering a school building.

Representatives voted 42-17 to send the

measure to the Senate for further debate. Supporters said school boards, particu-

larly in rural areas where no law enforcement officers are stationed in school buildings, need the option of arming teachers, administrators or volunteers to protect against attacks like last month's school shooting in Connecticut. Opponents countered that arming teachers could make schools more dangerous because it could lead to accidental shootings

and put guns in the hands of people who are trained to teach, not shoot people.

The bill's main sponsor, Rep. Scott Craig, R-Rapid City, said the measure leaves it up to each school board to decide whether to train and arm teachers and others. Schools are now inviting targets for potential mass murderers because they are considered gun-free zones, he said.

Crofton Begins New Recycling **Program**

CROFTON, Neb. — Thanks to a new program, the city of Crofton (Neb.) will begin providing a curbside recycling program today (Wednesday) with no increase in cost to its residents. Instead of offering a weekly trash

pickup, the city will now alternate between collecting garbage and recy-

cling each week. Art's Garbage/Waste Connections of Norfolk (Neb.), Crofton's waste management contractor, will provide both

"It's new for us, and it's new for Art's Garbage," said City Clerk Nancy Foxhoven. 'We're kind of a pilot program for them."

The new service is a welcomed change for many residents, Foxhoven said. Previously, individuals who wanted to recycle any materials needed to travel to Hartington (Neb.) or Yankton, as there was no local collection available, she said.

"We had a lot of requests to do some type of recycling from our residents," she

Foxhoven said the city had looked into offering recycling in the past, but could not find an affordable source to provide the service.

"So we started talking to Art's about having people who were interested in this, and they decided to come up with a program," she said. Vicki Haddock, Waste Connections dis-

trict manager, said the business had struggled in the past to find a solution for cities looking to add recycling, as the added service typically required another pickup with additional costs.

"This is the solution we came up with,

Exchange Pastor Makes Most Of Time In Gayville

A pastor from Cameroon is wrapping up a three month long learning experience in Gayville

today (Wednesday).

Tim Sodea, who is the pastor at seven Lutheran churches in Cameroon, has been visiting the Gayville Lutheran Church as part of a pastoral exchange. The purpose of the exchange is so each pastor can learn from each other about the church life in each place.

"Each evangelical Lutheran church in the United States is related to another church in a different part of the world, and we're related to the churches in Cameroon," said Ralph Egbert, pas-tor of Gayville Lutheran Church. "It's mostly people from the United States going over there to put roofs on churches and support the education system they have in Cameroon.'

While in Gayville, Sodea has lived with Egbert and has spent time traveling around South Dakota meeting people. He has also been to Rapid City, Mitchell, Aberdeen, Sioux Falls, Springfield, Canton and Pierre, among others.

"While he's here in Gayville, he does pretty much everything that I do," Egbert said. "He comes with me when I do funerals, hospital visits and make calls, along with at-

sent in my application." Stevens won the title in 2012.

Schiferl was shocked when husband Greg handed her the phone a couple weeks ago and told her to return a call to this woman she had never heard of. At that moment, Jan didn't believe there was any rush. Greg came to her with the phone again and insisted she return that call immediately — he wouldn't tell her why.

"I was shocked to get that call," Schiferl said

and wondered what she would do next.

"I'm not the type of person to be in front of people and talk about myself," she said. "What had I gotten into?"

She wasn't challenged by the first set of questions in the application but the second set for the National Mother of the Year will go much further into depth.

For Schiferl, a typical day as a mom includes such stories as the one about confirmation class and missing supper. Making sacrifices every day for her children is a just a way of life for her.

"Ever since I was a little girl, all I wanted was to be a stay-at-home mom," said Schiferl. "I'm very thankful Greg was able to make it happen. Sure, he was on the road a lot with his job but he always made time for the family.'

She thought back fondly on all the many sacrifices they made as a young couple in order to
