Defense Presenting Case In Infant Death Trial

PARKER (AP) — The defense is presenting its case this week in the trial of a South Dakota man accused of killing his infant son. The *Daily Republic* newspaper reports that prosecutors rested their case against 39-year-old Chris Miller on Friday after almost five days of testimony. The trial is expected to conclude later this week after the defense finishes presenting its case and jurors deliberate. Miller, of the southeastern town of Scotland, is being tried on several charges including second-degree murder in the March 2011 death of 4-month-old Jacob Miller. Prosecutors allege that Chris Miller killed the infant by shaking and beating him. Defense attorneys say Miller's wife rolled over on the child while in a drunken stupor.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures traded mixed Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for March delivery fell 2.25 cents to \$7.77 a bushel; March corn added 0.25 cent to \$7.2950 a bushel; March oats fell 1.25 cent to \$3.60 a bushel; while March soybeans rose 4 cents to \$14.5175 a bushel. Beef and pork futures fell on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. February live cattle fell 0.68 cent to \$1.2827 a pound; March feeder cattle fell 1.08 cent to \$1.4882 a pound; February lean hogs slipped 0.07 cent to 87.10 cents a pound.

with every other week trash and every other week recycling," she said. "We're convinced it's going to be a very successful program." Crofton residents now have two 96-gallon containers, one for trash and one for recycling. Items accepted for recycling in single stream include: corrugated cardboard, newspapers, chipboard, paper egg cartons, magazines, junk mail and office papers, phone books, plastic bottles and jugs, aluminum beverage cans, tin or steel cans, clean aluminum foil and trays, plastic and paper grocery bags, trash bags without any trash, dry cleaning bags, glass bottles and jars and plastic six-pack rings. "The nice thing about it is, it's the easiest type of recycling," Foxhoven said. "You don't have to sort plastics and keep everything in a separate bin. Some programs, you have to separate plastics from cans, and keep those separate from paper. With this program, anything that is considered recyclable that is on their list goes in one canister. Everything not recyclable goes in another canister. So once you figure out what's recyclable, it's easy." Starting with the trash collection on Feb. 6, only items inside the trash container will be picked up. Additional trash services can be requested at an additional charge by calling the city clerk's office at 402-388-4766. Before deciding to implement the program, Foxhoven said the city tested the service last summer with approximately 20 houses to gauge residents' interest. "A lot of people don't like change, so some of them are apprehensive about it," she said. "But for the most part, we've had a lot of positive feedback on it." Since residents can now recycle an estimated 70 percent of their garbage, Foxhoven said there were concerns that the recycling containers could become full before a scheduled pickup. However, no problems were reported during the testing phase, she said. Haddock said Art's Garbage/Waste Connection also recently implemented a similar program in Winside (Neb.) with positive results thus far. "The first couple weeks have gone without a hitch," she said. "We don't really have any concerns other than the discomfort some people may have with the process of change. It's more just retraining residents in what to do and when." Foxhoven said all residents are required to follow the new guidelines, although the city will not penalize individuals for failing to do so. However, residents could face additional fees, Haddock said. "If there is contamination in recycling and that has to be emptied as trash, then there will be an extra charge to them for having to pay for the excess trash," she said. "It's a pilot program, so we're hoping people will work with us," Foxhoven added. "I know some people don't like change, but I think it's a good thing, because recycling is important."
