Kent Wintersteen

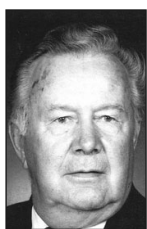
Kent Wintersteen, age 83 of Olivet, SD passed away in Freeman, SD on Saturday, January 26, 2013.

Memorial services will be 11 a.m. Saturday, February 2, 2013 at the Olivet United Methodist Church, Olivet, with Rev. Dan Flyger and Rev. Tom Peterson officiating.

As a young boy, Kent was intrigued by Indian designs because he liked the solid colors. To this day, he has one of the most extensive privately owned and historically significant collection of Indian artifacts in the Midwest;

Olivet, SD to Warren & Leota (Barth) Wintersteen. He married Shirley Grimm on August 26, 1950 in Olivet, SD. To this union, 3 daughters and 2 sons were born. He joined the United States

with the majority of his pieces displayed at the Heritage Hall Museum in Freeman.

Kent was a rancher all his life, with a devotion to God, family and the land. Thursday, December 31, 1987 was the last day of a 34 year career with the U.S. Rural Postal Service. He rode his last mile on his Arabian horse to replicate the pony express. In his early years, he was a Boy Scout Troop Master, involved in the Youth Fellowship Group and a Sunday School Teacher. He was a member of Olivet United Methodist Church, Women's Christian Temperance Union, Arabian Horse Association, Miracle of Jesus Pageant on the banks of the James River, Marchionna Cattle Producer and Charter member of the Olivet Community

Center.

Kent is quoted on his Indian artifact collection in an article reproduced from LIVING HERE Magazine. "The afternoon light is fading as Wintersteen abruptly concludes his narrative. Sinking into his easy chair, he sighs heavily. He is surrounded by tales and treasures of a bygone era. He is thinking about life...and he is thinking about death. 'My wife, Shirley, has been gone for ten years,' he says, his voice thick with emotion, 'and I miss her very much'. Wintersteen fingers a well-worn Bible on a side table, 'I have no fear of death whatsoever. I have the promise of seeing my wife again. Sometimes I feel a little bit guilty ... because I look more forward to seeing my wife than to

seeing the Lord.'"

He is survived by his sons, Kent (Lynn) Wintersteen, Jr. of Olivet, SD and Robert (Maggy) Wintersteen of St. Charles, IL; daughters: Sharee (Larry) DenHerder of Sioux Center, IA, Kris (Lee) Larson of Freeman, SD, and Cinda (Scott) Kutil of Castlerock, CO; grandchildren: Ross (Dena) DenHerder, Reid (Rhiannon) DenHerder, Maggie (Chad) Phelps, Thaddeus (Tammy) Larson, Tiffany (Andy) Bauman, Evan Wintersteen, Ellie Wintersteen, Joshua (Ryan) Wintersteen, Latisha (Bill) Mecha, Gavin (Allison) Kutil, Chelsie Kutil and Emily Kutil, and six great-grandchildren. He will be remembered the most by his grandchildren for their visits to Isenglass Hill and the "rainbow

tree".

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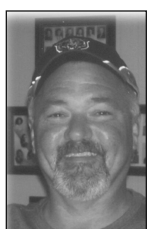

a collector well at Paddle Wheel Point, which is just east of the city's wastewater treatment plant. The goal is to be able to find a source with a capacity of 5 million to 10 million gallons per day.

While Yankton gets water piped over from wells on the Nebraska shore, approximately 50 percent of its supply still comes from the surface water intake pipe in the Missouri River near the Discovery Bridge.

CONSERVATION MEASURES BEING CONSIDERED

Water collection isn't the only area being looked at in advance of the summer high water usage period, city officials say. Conservation efforts are also being considered.

"We want to start looking at water conservation policies for the summer in case we get to that point," City Manager Amy Nelson said. "We're looking at what other communities have for water restrictions. It will probably be an ordinance but not necessarily en-

forced in terms of making people do it. Instead we'd just ask people to comply."

When a breakdown occurred at one of the city's two treatment plants last summer, a brief voluntary water restriction was placed on the city.

"We had no problems and most people cooperated," Goodman said. "But we have no ordinance in place if we would need to enforce it. We would like to have it on the books so if we need to enforce restrictions, we could. We also want to look at ways to promote water conservation through the summer months."

He said there are instances where residents run their sprinklers over night and probably over-water their lawns.

"People don't shut them off until morning and you see the

water running down the curb," Goodman said. "That's probably over-watering."

He added that the public may be asked to help the city by watering lawns in the morning rather than at night.

"One of the things we've run into is, our 1929 water treatment plant does not run automatically," Goodman said. "Ten years ago when we had high water usage, there weren't nearly as many automatic sprinklers out there. Our peak water usage was coming in a 6 or 7 in the morning. We wouldn't have to start the old plant until 6, 7 or 8 in the morning. Now, with all these automated sprinklers, they will turn on at 11 p.m. or midnight. A lot of times by 2 a.m. we're not keeping up and have to call staff in to start the plant up."
