## **Is There A Teacher Shortage?**

SD Lawmakers To Examine Issue

PIERRE — The Legislature will debate this year whether South Dakota indeed has shortages of teachers.

A legislative study com-mittee filed a



resolution cludes "teachers are in short supply in this state, and that school districts of all

sizes are now struggling to retain qualified teachers and to fill teacher vacancies.

The resolution suggests the Legislature explore tuition reimbursement programs and other programs or policies "that could help attract more good people into the teaching profession in South Dakota, and to keep the good teachers that are already here.

Proof of those points isn't in plain sight, however.

Wade Pogany, executive director for the Associated School Boards of South Dakota, said he and the head of the school administrators organization are working with the University of South Dakota to gather data on the

status of teachers. The state Department of Education doesn't collect information related to open positions in school districts or the number of applicants for

## Yankton DOT Lauded With Award

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For a relatively little area office, 2013 was a big year. The South Dakota Department

Each year, the SDDOT's Operations Review Team in Pierre visits construction projects in each of the state's 12 area offices to evaluate whether work is being done according to policies and procedures, that specifications are being enforced and that quality of work is emphasized.

## 14 Hurt In Minneapolis Fire

MINNEAPOLIS — A billowing fire engulfed a three-story building with several apartments near downtown Minneapolis early Wednesday, sending more than a dozen people to hospitals with injuries — some critical — ranging from burns to trauma associated with falls.

An explosion was reported about 8:15 a.m., and within minutes a fire raged through the building, said Robert Ball, a spokesman for Hennepin County Emergency Medical Services. Paramedics,

amid sub-zero temperatures, responded to find victims on the ground, some with injuries that suggested they may have fallen multiple stories.

"It's not clear whether people were pushed out of the building from the explosion, or whether they fell or jumped out of windows to escape," Ball said.

No fatalities have been reported, but authorities weren't sure whether any residents were still inside the building. Its roof had partially collapsed, making it too dangerous for firefighters to enter
