Garrity To Seek Auditor Post

Yankton County's planning and zoning administrator has announced he is running for the county's auditor job. In a press release issued today (Thursday), Patrick Garrity announced his candidacy for the post. "I believe I have the skills to professionally implement the fiscal technology updates imposed by the State; improve communication with the public and other county departments; and complete all tasks required to successfully run the Auditor's office," Garrity said in the press release. A graduate of South Dakota State University, Garrity currently serves the community as Yankton County Planning and Zoning Administrator. He and his wife Jan (Karolevitz) Garrity operated Garrity's Prairie Gardens in rural Mis-

sion Hill from 1984 to 2006. Garrity said his campaign will focus on improving the capabilities to operate an efficient Auditor's office. "My primary goal will be to complete the required tasks in a professional and efficient manner at the least possible expense to Yankton County taxpayers," he said. Patty Hojem is the current auditor. She was appointed by the Yankton County Commission after the resignation of Paula Jones last June. The appointment runs through March 1, 2015. Hojem has not announced whether she plans to run for a four-year term. Garrity said he plans to provide cross training for staff in the auditor's

office to ensure personnel changes do not disrupt normal business activity. While currently employed with Yankton County, Garrity is also a Boy Scout fundraising volunteer; Local Foods specialist for the South Dakota Value-Added Development Center; and President of the South Dakota Specialty Producers Association. Garrity is a member of Sacred Heart Church. The Garritys live in Yankton. Their son, Sam, is a senior at South Dakota State University in Brookings. In addition to his role as Planning and Zoning Administrator, Garrity serves as Yankton County drainage and floodplain administrator. He also acts as facilitator for a committee that is studying the best possible future for the Highway 52 corridor west of Yankton.

Man Sentenced In Federal Drug Case

SIOUX FALLS — An Irene man was sentenced in federal court last week in connection with drug conspiracy case. According to a press release from U.S. Attorney Brendan V. Johnson issued Tuesday, Jeremy Eric Zurcher, 24, was sentenced to 168 months in custody to be followed by 5 years of supervised release after being convicted of Conspiracy to Distribute a Controlled Substance. Zurcher was sentenced by U.S. District Judge Karen E. Schreier on Dec. 23. Zurcher was indicted by a federal grand jury on July 9, 2013, for conspiracy to distribute 500 grams or more of a mixture or substance containing methamphetamine. He pleaded guilty on Oct. 4. As his part in the conspiracy, Zurcher purchased more than 500 grams of methamphetamine and distributed it to customers in Sioux Falls. This case was investigated by the Sioux Falls Police Department, the Nebraska State Patrol, and the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration. Assistant U.S. Attorney John E. Haak prosecuted the case. Zurcher was immediately turned over to the custody of the U.S. Marshals Service.

Marion Man Sentenced For Conspiracy

SIOUX FALLS — A Marion was has been sentenced in a federal court after being convicted in a conspiracy to distribute drugs. According to a press release from U.S. Attorney Brendan V. Johnson issued Tuesday, Larry Wayne Alver, 37, was sentenced Monday to 10 years in jail to be followed by five years of supervised release. He was also ordered to pay a \$100 special assessment to the Federal Crime Victims Fund. He was sentenced by U.S. District Court Judge Karen E. Schreier. Alver was indicted by a federal grand jury on May 8, 2013, of conspiracy to distribute 500 grams or more of methamphetamine. He pleaded guilty on Sept. 9. During his involvement in the conspiracy, Alver purchased methamphetamine from a co-conspirator and distributed it. He also facilitated the distribution of methamphetamine by introducing his source of supply to another dealer. This case was investigated by the Sioux Falls Police Department, the South Dakota Division of Criminal Investigation, and the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration. Assistant U.S. Attorney John E. Haak prosecuted the case. Alver was immediately turned over to the custody of the U.S. Marshals Service.

This is a totally free medical clinic for urgent care conditions. Servant Hearts Clinic provides care for physical, mental health, emotional, and spiritual issues, and may serve as an entry point to other services in the community. Services not provided by SHC at this time include dental, diagnosis or treatment for sexually transmitted diseases, HIV testing, prenatal care, treatment for emergency medical conditions, radiology, immunizations and chiropractic care. The clinic does not prescribe any narcotics. Future clinics are planned for the first and third Monday of each month. The date of the next clinic is Jan. 20.
