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MENNO — When she arrived in Menno a decade and a half ago, Cindee Evenson had no visions of coaching. Teaching is where she thought her biggest impact could

"A lot of people go through college with coaching as their goal, but with me, I've always had a passion for running," said Evenson, the head cross country and assistant track coach for the Wolves.

"I never envisioned myself as a coach, but I've grown to love it." And now the Freeman native and graduate of Freeman Academy is

being honored for that impact. Evenson was named Wednesday the Assistant Coach of the Year for Girls Sports by the South Dakota High School Coaches Association. She will be among the honorees recognized during the SDHSCA annual

erdeen.

The story of her rise up the coaching ladder starts back in 1999 or 2000 (nobody is really sure) and with head cross country coach Ken

Bruckner, a long-time fixture in the Menno coaching scene, had to use some creative persuasion to convince Evenson to give coaching

a try.
"Our previous coach had left, and I knew Cindee liked to run, so I asked if she was interested," he said Thursday. "I'm pretty sure she would say she struggled with it at first, but once she was in there

working with the kids, she loved it." Evenson, who teaches math and physical science in the Menno School District, said she was informed of her honor during a coaches clinic last July. And yes, it was hard to not tell everyone in

and friends," she joked, 'but you don't go around saying, 'I got this award, look at me.

Instead, she has chosen to focus on her kids and their progression through the varsity ranks, Bruckner

"She's there for the kids, she's not there for any personal glory," he said. "When I told her I nominated her, she gave me a look like, 'Why?' "Her hard work says it all."

Those around her realize that her impact on the Menno cross country and track programs goes well beyond conference titles and state qualifiers, according to activities director Jacque Liebl.

She strives for the best and works hard with the kids to get them to excel," said Liebl, who called the coaching award "well-deserved."

"She resurrected our cross country program some years ago and she brings positive energy to the

upbeat and positive attitude and she instills that in the kids.

Even if it is difficult at times to keep that positive mentality when

numbers are down, Evenson said. Last fall, she had seven athletes between the girls' and boys' teams, but that figure has consistently fluctuated, she said.

There were a few years where we didn't have enough interest to have a team," Even said. "With the younger kids, it's a big commitment to stay with it, because most are either doing volleyball or football."

Scheduling can also present problems, Evenson said. She pointed to the date of the Cornbelt Conference meet as falling after school lets out for the year, which requires kids to continue practicing and training.

"It's an extra challenge," Evenson said.

Such concerns aren't specific to

only Menno, however, as Bruckner pointed out.

That's the bad thing about a small town, you need enough kids for cross country and volleyball, and some coaches don't want them to do both," he said. "She does a great job trying to recruit younger kids.

And in kind, Evenson was quick to reference Bruckner's influence.

"I really have to give him a lot of credit for getting me started," she said. "He's been a great mentor and has helped me out in so many

Such responses would be typical of Evenson's personality, Liebl said. She would be the first to tell you that she doesn't coach for the awards, she coaches for the kids and that shows what a true coach is all about," Liebl said. "Coaches put in a lot of hours and it is nice for her to be recognized by her peers.'

USD Escapes Matador Charge

Coyotes Let 15-Point Lead Slip Away, But Beat CS-Northridge

VERMILLION — Joey James' fist pump and vocal yell after the buzzer told the whole story.

His team finally got over

Having lost their previous six games (and surrendering 98 points a game over the last three), the Coyotes made the big plays in the big moments down the stretch to edge Cal State Northridge 76-75 on Thursday night at the DakotaDome.

And so, there was just as much of a sense of relief as a sense of celebration for USD

"Once again, we've been in this situation before," said James, the program's interim head coach. "I'm really happy for our guys that we came out on top this time.'

That situation was a double-digit halftime lead that was quickly erased by a hotshooting opponent that finished 21-5 in second-chance

Northridge, a Big West Conference member coached by Reggie Theus, used a 20-2 run early in the second half to lead by as many as eight points with 3:42 remaining. But it wasn't enough.

USD sophomore point guard Trey Norris hit a pair of free throws with 12 seconds left to push the Coyotes in front by one and the host team's defense stood tall in the final seconds.

"It's very big," Norris who led with 20 points said of the magnitude of the win. "We've been in so many close games at the end, just to finish one out at home is a

good feeling. "We needed this win very

Not even just to end the long losing streak, but to help regain some confidence, according to junior Brandon

"It's huge for us, losing six straight hurts a lot," said Bos, who scored 13 points. "We definitely needed to come out here with good energy,

'Our focus was there tonight, which was what we needed. We were finally able to close out a game; we've been in so many close games

And playing in the Dakota-Dome certainly helps, said James, whose team played nine of its first 12 games on

"It makes a big difference when you're at home, you got the crowd behind you, you're comfortable, you're confident," he said.

When you're on a 6-game losing streak and you're right there, and you feel like things start going wrong, being at home helps you get you over the hump.

Spurred by a 7-of-7 start from three-point range, the Coyotes wasted little time pouncing on the Matadors leading 14-2 and by as many as 17 points in the first half.

The halftime cushion was 45-33, but again, USD let that slip away. The Coyotes were in front 47-33 with 19:31 to play, but within five minutes, Northridge had taken a 50-49 lead thanks to a surge on the

The Irish led by double digits less than 5 minutes into their game against South Dakota State and hit 17 of their first 21 shots on the way to a 94-51 rout of the Jackrabbits on Thursday

McBride scored 18 points on 8-for-8 shooting from the field and 2 for 2 on free throws, and also had four

Ex-Vikings Punter: Coach Made Anti-Gay Remarks

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Former Minnesota punter Chris Kluwe says his special teams coordinator made anti-gay comments while Kluwe was with the Vikings, an allegation the coach

vehemently denies.' In an article posted Thursday on the website Deadspin, Kluwe wrote that coach Mike Priefer made several anti-gay comments in objection to

an anti-gay marriage amendment in Minnesota.

Kluwe also says former Vikings coach Leslie Frazier and current general manager Rick Spielman encouraged him to tone down his rhetoric in an effort to reduce distractions to the team. At the same time, Kluwe said, Vikings owner Zygi Wilf expressed support for Kluwe's

Kluwe's outspoken opposition of championing of gay rights. Hours later, Priefer issued a statement disputing Kluwe's portrayal of the events.

"I want to be clear that I do not tolerate discrimination of any type and am respectful of all individuals," Priefer said. "I personally have gay family members who I love and support just as I do any family member.

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
