Wagner Finding Her Rhythm For MMC

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Through six games of her college career, Logan Wagner was averaging five points a game and struggling to find an offensive rhythm. In time, however, that all changed for the

freshman guard for the Mount Marty College women's basketball team. "It definitely takes some time," Wagner said

Tuesday. "It takes you a while to get acclimated to everything, to know what your role is. Sooner than she had expected, the Parkston native was playing big minutes for the Lancers

(7-8), who host No. 19-ranked Briar Cliff tonight

(Wednesday) at 6 p.m. at Cimpl Arena. The reason for more time on the court? In-

Mount Marty has battled through not one, not two, but a handful of injuries to key players this season — including all-conference point guard April Winne for the season. Suddenly, out of necessity, Wagner was thrown into a starting

"I knew I had to step up," she said. "And not just me, everybody's felt that way. I feel like we've done that to a certain extent.

Wagner has reached double figures in points in each of her last eight games, and has averaged 16.5 points in that span. She is also nearly as dangerous inside the three-point line (44 percent) as she is from long range (42 percent). For the season, she averages 11.6 points — third on the team.

In short, Wagner has fit in nicely to a Mount Marty system that has traditionally ranked among the nation's best in three-point shooting.

Even if there was no choice but the 5-foot-7 shooter to fit in right away.

'You almost have to when you're thrown into that situation," Wagner said. "You can either progress or fold. "You have to take that opportunity; take that

challenge.' With so many injuries — as many as eight players have missed time with injury — at this

point in the season, the Lancers have turned to newcomers for big minutes. That's what we tell our kids, that every-

body's misfortune is someone else's fortune," head coach Tom Schlimgen said Tuesday. "It gives them an opportunity to shine." There wasn't one particular play or one par-

ticular game that served as the turning point, but Wagner said it was a collective stretch that proved she could play at this level. 'Once you realize that, 'Yeah, I can do this,' it

just gives you confidence," she said. And that's one thing Wagner has never

lacked, according to Schlimgen — who also has Wagner for women's golf at MMC.

If you watch her work out, she spends a lot of extra time in the gym, and she even does some extra stuff," Schlimgen said. "We know she's always been that way, the Parskton coaches always told us.

"But it's not an accident that some kids are great shooters."

With the Lancers' style predicated on having solid shooters (from positions one through five), missing key pieces naturally hurts, Wagner said. "You'd think we've used up all of our bad

luck," she joked. "It's a bummer, because you know your teammates are suffering, and it's also hard for the

team, because we know those people make us At some point in the next handful of weeks, Mount Marty expects to get sophomore Holly Hegge (9.1 ppg) and freshman Kieran O'Malley

(11.7 ppg) back. Until then, the Lancers are left to find a for-

mula to contend with the likes of Briar Cliff. 'Until you get out there and see how fastpaced the game is, it can take you a while,' Schlimgen said. "That's the scary thing for us, we'll have a lot of young kids on the floor."

Another tradition for the MMC women? They have tended to pull one major upset a season, if not a couple. Last season, for example, the Lancers beat fourth-ranked Morningside.

Briar Cliff, though, plays a frenetic pace – with full-court pressure — that could cause problems for a young team. We have to handle the ball; handle their

pressure," Wagner said. "It's about time for an "It's about time for one of those."

'With the way we're playing, everyone's excited to be out there," said Olson, a senior guard who scored 11

The Bucks (3-2) put four players in double figures and forced 26 turnovers in winning a second consecutive lop-sided game.

And for good measure, Yankton held Brookings' leading scorer Tyler Nagy — who came in averaging 29 points a game — to 15 points on 5-of-15 shooting.

'Tyler is so good that we wanted to get the ball out of his hands as much as possible," Bucks head coach Chris Haynes said. "And when did get the ball, we wanted to double him. And I think he started he pressing a little
