# Matchbox' Is A Beautiful Diary

"The Matchbox Diary," by Paul Fleischman, illustrated by Bagram Ibatoulline, Candlewick Press, 2013. 40 pages.

How can you learn about a person? You could read their words, events and feelings in their life that they wrote about in letters or a diary. But what if they couldn't read or write when they were younger? It turns out words aren't the only way to tell a story.

An old man stands in a room filled with old items. His great-granddaughter, whom he has never met before, is amazed by all the things. He tells her to pick what she likes the most and he'll tell her its story. She chooses a cigar box. Don't know

what that is? It's a cardboard box about

the size of a book that used to hold cigars, which are like big cigarettes. This particular cigar box is filled with matchboxes, which used to hold wooden matches to light the cigars. The girl opens a matchbox. It has an olive pit inside. The old man explains

that when he was a young boy in Italy and was hungry, his mother would give him an olive pit to suck on.

The next box has an old, faded, bent-



up photo of a man. It's the old man's father, who was away in America trying to start a new life for his family. He sent a photo of himself so they wouldn't forget him. Sometimes he would write letters, but neither the boy, his mother, nor his four sisters could read, so they had to go to the schoolmaster's son to read it to them. The schoolmaster's son also wrote in a diary every day.

The young girl and old man continue opening up the matchboxes. Each item

tells another piece of the old man's journey from Italy to America with his family. A broken tooth tells of how young men would throw stones at the boy and his family because they didn't want Italians in their country. A ticket stub tells of a special day spent sitting with his father at a baseball game that he didn't under-

Then the old man tells of his parents arguing over whether he should go to school to learn to read and write as his mother wanted. Who won? Well, the next box has a lead letter from the man's job as a typesetter. You'll have to check out this book to see what a lead letter is and how it was used.

The girl loves all the items and the story they tell. She wants to keep a diary too. But she's only in kindergarten and doesn't read and write yet.

This picture book is beautifully done. The illustrations do a superb job of setting the mood and conveying the old man's story, as well as showing the love and connection between the man and his great-granddaughter. It's for ages 6-9, but many an older person will find this to be a comforting book. And if you don't like the story (which you will), you can forget the words and play I-Spy with all the antiques telling their own stories in the illustrations.

The top group at the semifinal will go on the finals in New York City on April 26.

# **Artwork Sought For Quasquicentennial Exhibit**

SIOUX FALLS — The Center for Western Studies (CWS) at Augustana has announced a juried art exhibit and sale of original works of art by current and past residents of South Dakota in observance of the state's 125th anniversary of statehood.

The exhibit and sale, which will run June through September, is entitled "South Dakota 2014: Artists Respond to the State's 125th Anniversary.'

The exhibit carries a \$2,500 grand prize and \$1,500 in additional cash prizes, funded by the Center for Western Studies.

Native American artists are encouraged to share their unique perspectives on ways in which statehood has impacted the lives of indigenous peoples.

For the 2014 exhibit and sale, artists must submit a proposal for the single work of art to be judged. The deadline for the proposal is

Friday, Jan. 17, 2014. Both two- and three-dimensional pieces are welcome, but the work of art must be suitable for display on a gallery wall or pedestal.

The proposal must include a brief artist's statement about the work as a response to the observance of South Dakota's 125th anniversary. Proposal forms are available at www.augie.edu/cws or by calling the Center for Western Studies at 605-274-4007.
