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Go Omaha! Manning Gives Neb. City Game Shoutouts

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Peyton Manning can't stop shouting about Nebraska's largest city.

The Denver Broncos quarterback used the word "Omaha" loudly and often during Sunday's playoff victory over the San Diego Chargers.

According to an NFL.com video montage, Manning barked "Omaha" before the ball was snapped 44 times during the game.

The reason for the word choice, if there is one, is known only to Manning and the Broncos.

But it provided some unexpected publicity for the city of 427,000, perhaps best known as the home of both billionaire Warren Buffett and the Fortune 500 insurance company Mutual of Omaha (sponsor of the old TV show Wild Kingdom").

"I think it shows Peyton Manning really loves Omaha,"

Mayor Jean Stothert said Monday. "I'll personally take him on a tour. He has an official invitation now.

Omaha was a trending topic on Twitter during the game, and the Greater Omaha Convention and Visitors Bureau jumped aboard, tweeting: "We certainly appreciate all the love from Peyton Man-

Greater Omaha Chamber of Commerce President and CEO David Brown said he

was watching the game, and he wondered how his agency could capitalize.

Brown said he wants to explore the possibility of hiring Manning, one of the sporting world's top pitchmen, to shoot a promotional ad for Omaha.

'We'd be foolish not to," Brown said, adding that he realizes Manning's fee probably would be prohibitive.

Alcester-Hudson Opens Doors For Young Gymnast

Family, School Work Together To Allow Seventh Grader To Continue Competing In Sport She Loves BY PETER CHAPMAN

Twelve-year-old Heidi Renken has competed in club gymnastics competition and has had a passion for the sport since she was three years old. Now, in seventh grade, Heidi is using her talents at Alcester-Hudson to compete in varsity level high school competition this year.

Heidi's decision to leave club competition came from a desire to participate in other high school sports while still competing in gymnastics. The problem is that club training would not allow time for Heidi to compete in both due the sports season overlap.

After looking at a couple of alternative competition options, Kim Renken, Heidi's mother and traveling coach, decided to approach the school board with a proposal to sign Heidi up independently to compete for Alcester-Hudson.

We got contacted by the parents of this girl, and they were wondering if the school would sponsor gymnastics, in name, so that we could get Heidi into some of the local events around here instead of having to travel far away to some of the weekend tournaments and stuff like that," Alcester-Hudson Athletic Director Mike Seivert said.

The proposal stated that the school would pay entry fees for competitions and for her uniform, while Heidi's mother would be her coach at competitions and take care of transportation.

"They were wondering about where she would train and all that," Kim said. "We said she would continue to train with her club and her regular coaches, but this would give her more competitive experience and this would also allow her to participate in other sports as she gets older.'

In order to practice, Heidi and her mom drive to The Turn Around gymnastics gym in Le Mars, Iowa.

Kim said that Heidi trains for five hours a week, on Tuesdays and Thursdays, making the 30-mile trip to the gym three times a week; twice for Heidi and once to take her younger daughter to club practice.

As Heidi's travelling coach, Kim has taken the state required coaching classes online and has started coaching her younger daughter's Monday club sessions. This way she can be more helpful when at competitions with Heidi.

'It's been a huge commitment," Kim said. "But it's one of those things that as long as we're doing it, we might as well get the most out of it that we can while we can.

Seivert said that this could be a program where other young girls who are interested, who are at clubs in places like La Mars could compete in high school competition as well. But right now Heidi is the only gymnast that Alcester Hudson has.

Heidi has competed at three competitions so far and has three remaining this season. She will next compete at the Madison Invitational Saturday.
