Youth Sports Specialization Not Only Unnecessary, But Harmful To Development

Should kids specialize in one sport? That is a question that nearly every parent who has a child involved in sports has had to ponder. As a former three-sport athlete and as someone who has covered athletics for over half his life, my answer has always been, "no," based on my personal feelings. But new studies are also showing that specialization for young kids is not a good idea.

A recent article on the "Changing The Game Project" website, titled "Is It Wise To Specialize?" cites several sources that say specialization at a young age can be detrimental to kids.

Here are some notes from that article:

- Children who specialize in a single sport account for 50 percent of overuse injuries in young athletes, and were 70 to 93 percent more likely to be injured;
- Children who specialized early in a single sport led to higher rates of adult physical inactivity;
- Children who specialize early are at a far greater risk for burnout due to stress, decreased motivation and lack of enjoyment;
- A 2013 study found that 88 percent of college athletes participated in more than one sport as a child.

There is an early study that says that student-athletes who want to play at a high level in a certain sport need to log 10,000 hours prior to age 20, but not all of these hours need to be logged in that sport. For example, a 2003 study of pro hockey players noted that while most pros had spent 10,000 hours or more involved in sports prior to age 20, only about 3,000 hours were logged in hockey-specific practice (and only about 450 of those hours prior to age 12).

So what does that say about how we prepare athletes?

First off, let kids play whatever, not just one sport. This article recommends that no more than 20 percent of time should be spent on a chosen sport prior to age 12. Even after age 16, 20 percent of training time should be spent on other activities.

Second, remember that there are many times more academic scholarships than athletic ones. Encourage your children to be active, but encourage them to be good students as well as good athletes. Doors open up for individuals who have intelligence in the classroom, as well as the leadership and perseverance taught in athletics.

One final note — a person who works with athletes commented on the original shared post, saying he was working with a couple of girls who had never learned to skip, in part because they were pushed into so many structured activities. If someone goes through childhood without learning to skip or play all those little playground games, what kind of childhood is that?

USD Track Adds Four Athletes

VERMILLION — South Dakota Director of Track and Field and Cross Country Lucky Huber announced Thursday the additions of Teivaskie Lewin, Luke Worden, Ashley Thompson and Lauren Hill, who joined the Coyotes' track and field team this semester. All four will compete on USD's indoor team this season.

Lewin arrived in Vermillion by way of Montego Bay, Jamaica, and Butte Community College in California. At Butte, Lewin set program records in the 110-meter hurdles and in the long jump. He became the junior college state champion with a leap of 24 feet, 3.75 inches at the state championship meet at the College of San Mateo last May.

Worden, a native of Scottsbluff, Neb., also competes as a defensive back on the USD football team. Worden finished second at the Nebraska state championship in the 100 and has a personal-best time of 10.70s in the event. He earned a state championship as a member of the

400-meter relay team at Scottsbluff High School. Thompson attended Stevens High School in Rapid City, S.D., where she won the 100-meter hurdles (15.19s) and the 300-meter hurdles (45.46s) at the 2012 South Dakota Class AA State Track and Field Championships. She also took second in the triple jump with a leap of 38 feet, 4.5 inches.

Hill, from Tea, S.D., placed in the 300-meter hurdles at the state meet five times while running for Tea High School. She owns a personal-best mark of 46.89s in the event. Hill is expected to run in the 60-meter hurdles and in the 400-meter dash this season.

Brookings' DeHaven Earns Gatorade Honor

CHICAGO — Brookings standout Addison DeHaven has been selected as the South Dakota Gatorade Boys' Cross Country Runner of the Year. He is the first boys' cross country honoree from Brookings.

The 6-foot, 135-pound senior won the 2013 Nike Cross Nationals Heartland Regional championships, breaking the tape in 15:08.9. DeHaven qualified for the 2013 Nike Cross Nationals Final, where he finished 17th in 15:24. The state's returning Gatorade Boys Cross Country Runner of the Year, he also took second at the Foot Locker Midwest Regional championships with a time of 15:09, and finished 18th at the national Foot Locker Cross Country Championships, crossing the line in 15:43. A three-time First Team All-State selection, DeHaven won his second straight Class AA individual state championship in 15:34.30.

DeHaven has maintained a 3.43 GPA in the classroom. He has volunteered locally on behalf of the Special Olympics, the Boys and Girls Club of America and as a youth track and field coach.

"Addison DeHaven has become an incredible individual both on and off the cross country course," said Brookings High head coach Chris Gruenhagen. "His work ethic is second-to-none and leadership with the rest of the team is incredible. His presence on the team will be greatly missed, but we are excited to see where life takes him in the future."

DeHaven has verbally committed to an athletic scholarship at the University of Wisconsin beginning this fall.

Two time winner DeHaven joins Gatorade South Dakota Boys Cross Country Runners of the Year Tony Smoragiewicz (2011-12 & 2010-11, Rapid City Central High School), Josh Heitkamp (2009-10, Washington), Alex Muntefering (2008-09, Parkston), and Bill Kogel (2007-08, Roosevelt) as athletes who have won the cross country award since its inception in 2007.

S.D. STATE 64, WESTERN ILLINOIS 55; BROOKINGS (AP) — Jordan Dykstra scored 20 points and Brayden Carlson added 16 as South Dakota State jumped out to an early lead and never trailed in a 64-55 victory over Western Illinois on Thursday night.

The Jackrabbits (10-8, 2-1 Summit) started the game with eight straight points, and went ahead 34-27 at the half. They opened up the second half on a 7-0 run and led by as many as 15 points after the break.

Dykstra went 10 of 10 and Carlson finished 9 of 10 from the free-throw line. South Dakota State shot 20 of 22 on free throws (90.9 percent) while Western Illinois finished at 66.7 percent (12 of 18).

Cody Larson added 13 points and 11 rebounds for the Jackrabbits.

Garret Covington led the Leathernecks (7-10, 1-1) with 24 points and three assists, and went 4 of 7 from behind the 3-point arc.

Oral Roberts (9-8, 3-1 Southland Conference) shot 54 percent from the floor, including 6 of 14 from beyond the arc, and out-rebounded Abilene Christian 34-23.

Korey Billbury chipped in with 13 points.

The Wildcats (6-11, 0-3) were led by Julian Edmonson with 26 points, his season-high, while Parker Wentz added 11.

The teams were tied at halftime at 39 after Oral Roberts scored the final six points before intermission.

The second half was all Oral Roberts, as the Golden Eagles outscored Abilene Christian by 23 after the break, using a 10-2 run as play resumed, breaking out to a nine point lead. A 19-4 stretch later in the game ex-

tended the lead to 22 to all but bury ACU.

MINNESOTA 63, NO. 11 OHIO STATE 53; MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Elliott Eliason had 12 points and 13 rebounds to help Minnesota muscle past 11th-ranked Ohio State for a 63-53 victory Thursday night that stuck the Buckeyes with their third straight loss.

DeAndre Mathieu had 13 points, five assists and three steals for the Golden Gophers (14-4, 3-2 Big Ten), who gave new coach Richard Pitino his first signature win. They did it by backing down the Buckeyes and owning the area around the basket, posting a 38-20 advantage in points in the paint and a 39-24 rebounding edge.

LaQuinton Ross scored 22 points for the Buckeyes (15-3, 2-3), who are on a three-game losing streak for the first time in almost four years. The other four Ohio State starters combined for only 19 points, and the conference's second-worst free throw shooting team went 11 for 18 from the foul line.

Oral Roberts Won't Have To Forfeit Games

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — The NCAA has granted Oral Roberts a waiver allowing the Golden Eagles to play two Southland Conference games they were being forced to forfeit.

Oral Roberts will play Abilene Christian on Thursday and Incarnate Word on Saturday as scheduled.

Abilene Christian and Incarnate Word are Division II Southland Conference programs that won't be Division I until 2014-15. An NCAA bylaw states Division I schools can play a maximum four non-Division I teams in a season, including exhibitions.

Oral Roberts already had played four non-Division I teams this season — two exhibition games and two regular-season games — so playing Abilene Christian and Incarnate Word would have violated the rule. The NCAA reached out to the Southland and other affected conferences last week and offered a blanket waiver.
