25 YEARS AGO

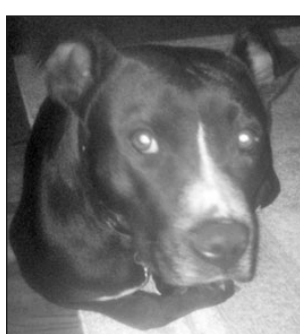

WALL ST. RECAP

The stock market was mostly down on Friday as investors digested the latest round of company earnings.

General Electric fell after profit margins at its industrial unit fell short of its own targets. Intel dropped after giving a weak revenue forecast for the first quarter. The Dow got a lift American Express, which reported that its net income more than doubled. The news also boosted Visa, another Dow member.

The Nasdaq composite dropped 21.11 points, or 0.5 percent, to 4,197.58.

4-H Program Helps Teens Enhance Skills

BROOKING — The 4-H Teens as Teachers program is designed as a tool to enhance 4-H youth development through Service Learning Projects which are planned and carried out by local youth. It is found under Tier 2 of T.E.A.M. Teens Educating Through Advocacy and Mentorship.

"Teens as Teachers creates opportunities for youth to develop and build leadership skills which are positive to their youth development and career paths for the future," said Karelyn Farrand, SDSU Extension 4-H Character Education Field Specialist.

This SDSU Extension 4-H program partners with the South Dakota 4-H Foundation, South Dakota Coordinated School Health, 21st Century Learning Centers and South Dakota School Districts to create learning communities that allow youth the opportunity to excel and grow their leadership skills while at the same time make a difference within their communities and schools. The program allows youth to practice self-initiative, leadership and teamwork; problem solve and plan by developing and carrying out lesson plans for grades 3-6.

"These leadership skills are what 21st century employers are looking for in viable employees, Farrand said.

South Dakota schools and Afterschool programs were given the opportunity to apply for the program. The program is designed in a team teaching format. School team recipients consist of four to eight-member teams. This year's program will be offered in five communities across the state, including:

Belle Fourche, Burke, Clark, Lake Andes and Winner.

The students will be using the Take A Stand Program which is an enrichment program that focuses on conflict management and bullying. The program lesson topics include: bullying, communication, teamwork, etiquette, social skills and empathy. These lessons align with the SD Health Education Standards.

Training sessions were offered in three locations: at the SDSU Extension Regional Center in Rapid City, Winner and Watertown.

Teens will attend one of the sessions and take their training back to their local 3rd-6th grade youth in elementary classrooms and after school programs.

Teens will design and carry out lessons in conjunction with local 4-H program advisors and teachers. They will write newsletters, plan activities and complete a Community Challenge as well as various evaluations.

Twenty-six high school age students will receive a \$500 scholarship upon completion of the program that will be established in an educational account at the South Dakota 4-H Foundation. The scholarship will be directed toward the post-secondary institution of the student's choice, upon payment of fees to that institution.
