Although the official statistics would show that opposing teams aren't necessarily adversely affected during the third and fourth quarters when they face the YHS students, the hometown players say they can

sense a difference. "It definitely adds a new atmosphere at the end of a game," Bucks senior Lane Sawatzke said. "It brings a new element to our games, I guess.

Through five home Bucks games, opposing teams are hitting 69 percent of their free throws in the first half and 61 percent in the second half when they are greeted by a loud and involved YHS student section.

In four Gazelles home games, however, opponents are shooting significantly better in the second half, 80 percent, compared to 59 percent in the first half.

Field goal percentages are better after halftime, as well, while visiting girls' teams are hitting 64 percent of their three-pointers in the second half — compared to 69 percent in the

Still, the Yankton Bucks are well ware of the impact their students can provide in a close game. Head coach Chris Haynes pointed specifically to the home opener against Watertown, when the Arrows went 9-of-16 at the line after halftime.

"Whether or not our crowd had anything to do with that, it's debatable," Haynes joked. "Regardless, it has been a better atmosphere."

The final decision on the home seating changes was made last fall after some initial discussions last summer, Mors said. It was met with open arms by the coaches, according to Gazelles head coach Doug Pesicka.

"As time goes on, I think the students are taking ownership of that part of the gym," Pesicka said. "It's their place to be a student at an activity. Kids are slowly buying into it.'

While students are well aware of where their new location is, it naturally took a while for visiting fans to adjust to the changes (even despite new signs for each section), Mors said. Particularly when it came to not having to be crammed into the home

Pesicka agreed, saying, "It's different, and it takes a while to get used to, but I think ultimately it's a good

The new changes also meant that Yankton's home bench switched sides, from the west end to the east end, nearest the main doors.

"It's kind of strange after 30 years, but I think the change has been good," Pesicka said. "There are a lot of us that have a place we like to sit; where we have for a long time, but change is good."
