The Book Shelf **Babe Ruth' Hits A Homer**

"Becoming Babe Ruth," by Matt Tavares, Candlewick Press, 2013. 40 pages.

What kid hasn't dreamed of playing pro sports when he or she grows up? But it's a pretty good bet that a boy named George Ruth never ever thought about playing sports when he was young. In fact, it's 1902, and George is on his way to a future in jail. He skips school. He roams the streets. He steals tomatoes and throws them at the horses and wagons going past. He steals money from the cash register in the saloon.

Finally, when he's 7 years old, his parents decide to take him to the Saint Mary's Industrial School for Boys. Maybe they can straighten out George. The boys call themselves inmates even though they're not prisoners. They have lots of rules: Get up at 6 a.m. sharp. Get dressed. Go to church. Eat breakfast. Go to class. George doesn't like the rules and he misses his family. But he does like one thing. The boys

get to play baseball almost every day. When Brother Matthias picks up the bat he sends the ball soaring high above the Big Yard, over and over and over. George has never seen anything like it. Brother Matthias takes George

under his wing and teaches him how to play baseball-curve balls, double plays, picking off a runner. Before long, the boys back up when George is going to

hit. He hits the ball way over the Big Yard. Word spreads. Soon crowds of people are coming to watch George play, including the owner of the Baltimore Orioles, who offers George a contract on the spot.

His teammates start calling this young kid Babe, and the name sticks. Babe Ruth quickly becomes a huge celebrity.

But bad news dampens his happiness-a fire has destroyed almost every building at Saint Mary's Industrial School for boys. Now Babe shows what kind of a man he has become. He brings the school band from St. Mary's on the road with his team. Before each game, they play a concert in the stands. People donate money to help rebuild St. Mary's.

This picture book is for ages 5 to 8, but it's an enjoyable book for everyone. It's a gentle, easy read, but yet very interesting. I'm sports-challenged but I learned way more about Babe Ruth than I ever knew.

So take a swing at this book. It's a home run.

Schmeckfest Tickets Now On Sale

FREEMAN — Orders are being accepted for tickets for the 56th annual Schmeckfest to be held in Freeman March 21-22 and 28-29. The popular festival, which began in 1959 with an ethnic German meal, has grown to a multifaceted festival now held on two consecutive weekends. A full three-course meal featuring the traditional foods of the Freeman community is served family style to 1,000 guests each night. Tickets for the meal are sold ad-

vance order only.

Tickets are also on sale for reserved seats for the 2014 Schmeckfest musical production "Children of Eden." It will be presented each night of Schmeckfest with an 8 p.m. curtain at Pioneer Hall. This is the first time the musical, written by Stephen Schwartz (who also wrote "Godspell," "Pippin" and "Wicked") is being staged as a Schmeckfest musical. The musical is based on the Biblical stories of Adam and Eve, and Noah and the ark. In addition to the performances scheduled during Schmeckfest, "Children of Eden" will also be presented Thursday, March 27; no Schmeckfest activities will be held on Thursday.
