WATERTOWN — The Yankton Bucks matched their season victory total of a year ago with a 55-49 victory over Watertown in Eastern South Dakota Conference boys' bas-

ketball action on Friday. Yankton went 6-15 a year ago, and improved to 6-4 (6-2 ESD) on this season. Watertown is now 6-5, 6-3 in the ESD.

The Bucks got off to a solid defensive start, but Watertown got hot in the second quarter to take a 30-28 halftime lead.

"We thought we executed well in the first quarter, but we didn't guard the three-point line in the second quarter," said Yankton head coach Chris Haynes. "We were disappointed to be down at the half."

The Arrows had hit a threepointer at the end of the second quarter to take an edge into the locker room, then hit another threepointer ahead of the buzzer in the third quarter to take a 44-38 lead into the final eight minutes.

"On the road, down six, I thought our kids responded well," Haynes
