Gazelles Second In Home Finale

In their final home meet of the season, the Yankton-Bon Homme gymnastics team picked an opportune time for one of their best performances

With the Eastern South Dakota Conference (ESD) meet looming in a week and a half, yeah, the Gazelles were happy with their secondplace finish at Tuesday night's home triangular.

Class AA perennial power Sioux Falls O'Gorman won the team title with a score of 144.45, followed by Yankton-Bon Homme (136.3) and Sioux Falls Washington (98.85).

In short, quite the challenge for the Gazelles in a tuneup for conference.

"We were really looking forward to having O'Gorman here for that exact reason,' said YBH head coach Luke Youmans, who referred to Thursday as a "reality check."

"We needed to figure out where we'll fit in with one through five at state."

First, though, the Gazelles bettered their season average which was 133.9 coming into Tuesday night. The best score of the season for YBH had been a 138.8.

With a chance to make a statement for the ESD meet, the Gazelles say they relished the opportunity.

That's why ESD and state are really important," said Elsie Kotalik, one of two seniors (Ashtyn Haak) competing in their final home action. This was a great test, def-

initely," Kotalik added.

O'Gorman had the top four finishers in the varsity all-around, led by champion Lizzie Miller (36.4). Kotalik was the top YBH finisher in fifth place at 34.35, followed by Haak (33.9).

Haleigh Diede (32.75), Kaitlin Guthmiller (32.6) and Sophie Bisgard (31.3) rounded out the all-around scores for the Gazelles. But the team still has some work to do. Youmans said.

HURON — Whitlee Larson and Lindsey Hale combined for 23 points for the Yankton Gazelles leading them to a 42-38 victory over the Huron Tigers.

In what would turn out to be a game of swings, the Gazelles jumped out to a big first quarter lead going up by a score of 12-2 after one quarter of play.

"We got out to a good start shot the ball well early," said head coach Doug Pesicka. "Huron kind of battled back, I think it was a twopoint game at half. But then we came out and did some really nice things in the first few minutes of the second half and held on at the end. All and all our kids did some really nice things tonight."

Morgan Tessier came up

big on the defensive end for the Gazelles with five defensive rebounds and five steals. The Gazelles had 15 steals in the game forcing the Tigers to 25 turnovers in the game. "Morgan had a great all-

around game for us tonight,' Pesicka said. "She has been having those kind of games for us the last five games. She plays hard and does a lot of little things for us with rebounding and steals and what we ask her to do both ends of the court on offense

and defense.' Pesicka said it was great for the moral of the team to get the win tonight.

"This was a big win from a lot of different angles," he explained. "First and foremost, I am happy for players. It is not easy to lose eight-nine in a row like we had. The last four games have been heart-

breakers where we were in the position to win and it slipped away. Sometime those losses are more difficult than getting beat by 25. But these girls have continued to work and stick to it. It was nice to walk into locker room and see smiles on faces as opposed to upset faces."

Pesicka noted that the team got contributions from many players in the game and that is encouraging moving on in the season.

Whitlee Larson shot the ball well early to get us going," he said. "Lindsay Hale did some nice things on offense for us and Sophie Drotsman did everything we asked of her inside tonight."

He explained that because

they are playing a lot of younger players, getting that confidence going in their games will be very important for the team.

"Playing a number of young players you have inexperience and sometimes they play indecisive," he said. "But just overall that is lack of experience. The last four losses in particular, that youth showed up at key times. I think that is another reason tonight is important for us. We did have a lot of kids make contributions. From that standpoint, just getting on the right side of the win loss column proving that we can win, that we can make the plays to win. I think that is important as we go forward.
