S.D. Legislative Panel Endorses School Aid Boost

> PIERRE — School districts won the first round Wednesday in their battle to persuade the South Dakota Legislature to provide extra state financial aid that educators say is needed to help them recover from state budget cuts im-

posed three years ago. The House Education Committee voted 13-2 to endorse the school financing measure and send it to the Joint Appropriations Committee, which will determine whether the state can afford to give schools more money than Gov. Dennis Daugaard has recommended.

Wade Pogany, director of the Associated School Boards of South Dakota, said school districts are struggling to provide programs and services that students need. Schools

cut some classes and programs after the budget cuts, and they are having trouble recruiting and keeping good teachers because of low

salaries, he said. The Republican governor's proposed budget would boost state aid to schools by 3 percent next year, nearly double the inflationary increase required by law. But groups representing school districts are asking the Legislature to instead provide a 3.8 percent in crease, which would put spending per student back where it was before budget cuts were made in 2011.

The 3.8 percent boost, which was proposed by a legislative study panel that met last summer, would require the state to spend \$5.3 million more than the governor has recommended.

But Jim Terwilliger of the state Bureau of Finance and

Management said projected state revenues for next year would not cover the extra \$5.3 million in spending.

If spending is boosted 3.8 percent for schools, the Legislature probably would follow tradition and give the same increase to state employee salaries and facilities that provide medical care to poor people in the Medicaid program, Terwilliger said. Increases for state employees and Medicaid providers would cost more money, he said.

Daugaard's plan would set spending per student from state and local funds at \$4,764 next year. School districts want it raised to \$4,805, the level in place before the 2011 cuts.

A final decision on state aid to schools likely won't be made until the Legislature passes a state budget in

Dallas Ross, Rufus' son, said he knew his father was a code talker and contacted Yankton Sioux tribal leaders. Dallas was pleased to attend Wednesday's ceremony but carried some bittersweet feelings.

"It would be much better if they were alive, but they probably wouldn't be here (at the ceremony) anyway (because of their age)," he said of his two code talker relatives.

Still, he was pleased that his family could gather for Wednesday's ceremony at Fort Randall Casino.

"This is much more important than the ceremony in Washington, D.C. It means much more," he said.

Dennis Rucker, the Yankton Sioux veterans service officer, said he and fellow YST member Basil Heth found it difficult to research which tribal members served as code talkers. The search lasted nearly a decade, he said, acknowledging that some code talkers may never be discovered.

"In 2003 and 2004, I got a call about whether we had code talkers. After eight or nine years of digging around in classified information — it was highly top secret — I came up with five or six

members," he said. "They didn't let the soldiers talk about (their codetalking mission). They were sworn to secrecy. They would carry this knowledge

to their grave. Rucker said he carried a special pride about the code talkers. He noted the irony of efforts to force tribal members to abandon the very language that saved lives and won the wars.

'The government restricted our language," he said. "We were sent to boarding schools and forbidden to speak our language, but we held on to our language and helped defeat our enemies.'

YST chairman Robert Flying Hawk welcomed Wednesday's audience, noting the special pride and bond felt in the room.

The medal speech was given by Heth, commander of American Legion McBride Post 257 and Veterans of Foreign Wars Blacksmith Post

Heth and Elmo Eddy, the last surviving World War II veteran among the Yankton Sioux, attended the Washington ceremony. Eddy accepted the Congressional Gold Medal of Honor on behalf of the tribe. While the movie

"Windtalkers" portrayed the Navajo as code talkers, Heth said 33 tribes were recognized at the Washington ceremony for their code talkers.

"When a nation called upon our young soldiers during the world wars, they gave freely of this language," he said of the code talkers. "The United States used other codes, but the enemy always managed to break those codes. At the Capitol ceremony, we learned those codes, the language that our people spoke, not one single time was it ever broken. You heard talk about the hundreds and thousands, the good many lives, that were saved as a result of these (code talkers') actions.'

At the Washington ceremony, the nation learned more about the code talkers. Heth said.

'There's a feeling that welled up inside, you were so proud. I can't find all the words to describe how it made me feel," he said. "We who are Natives to this country, we did (the mission) for our people and for our land."

Wednesday's ceremony included letters from U.S. Sens. Tim Johnson and John Thune of South Dakota. Remarks and greetings were also presented by Larry Zimmerman, secretary of the South Dakota Department of Military and Veterans Affairs, and Don Dahlin, senior State Vice Commander of the VFW.

Dahlin, who showed a

picture of Eddy receiving the gold medal for the Yankton Sioux Tribe, spoke of the long overdue recognition for the code talkers.

'These men's service and their language were tactics that saved numbers of lives during World War I and World War II. But this was a secret to the general public for more than 50 years," Dahlin said.

Wednesday's ceremony included the veterans' grand entry, the grand entry song by the Rising Hail Singers of Marty, the flag song performed by the Yankton Sioux Singers of Lake Andes and the prayer led by Willard Bruguier.

The program concluded with the Wiping of the Tears ceremony, led by Galen Drapeau Jr., and the presentation of star quilts to Drapeau and Dahlin.

Wesley Allen Hare Jr., the master of ceremonies, noted the historic significance of Wednesday's ceremony. He stressed the importance of recognizing the code talkers at home, before their family and friends, as well as in Washington.

'We may never see this again in our lifetimes," he
