# **USD Health Care Students Gear Up To Help In A Disaster**

VERMILLION — More than 300 health care students will converge in Vermillion on Jan. 31 to ready themselves to assist others in a potential, future disaster.

Disaster Training Day, held on the University of South Dakota (USD) campus, is designed to prepare future health care professionals to assist their communities should a disaster strike. In the past three years, 1,037 students have participated with 267 becoming certified in Core Disaster Life Support (CDLS) from the National Disaster Life Support Foundation (NDLSF). South Dakota is no stranger to disasters. Since the beginning of 2010, there have been 12 federally declared disasters in the state.

Along with CDLS certification, students will be given the opportunity to

register with the Statewide Emergency Registry of Volunteers in South Dakota (SERV SD). This registry coordinates the pre-registration of medical and healthcare professionals who are willing to volunteer during disaster situations.

CDLS training will be provided by six NDLSF certified instructors from South Dakota who will cover the essentials of disaster preparedness and how to perform effectively and safely in a disaster. Additional breakout sessions are focused on triage, anaphylaxis, psych first aid, immunizations and points of dispensing (POD). Sessions will be led by University faculty, Department of Health employees, Physician Leaders, and First Responders. There are 325 health care students


