
Bucks Split With Huron, Tea Area In Home Finale

"We got steam-rolled this past weekend and it looked like some of the guys were maybe giving up and had their confidence shaken up. Tonight, I thought they turned the corner a bit. Yankton went 1-1 in their final home dual with Tea Area and Huron at the Summit Center in Yankton on Thursday evening.

Yankton dropped a tough one in the opener to Huron, 57-15.

Anytime to wrestle Huron, you know what you're going to get," Hage said. You're going to get a very physical team, especially in the upper weights where those guys are pretty good."

To start off at the 106 weight class, sophomore Cody Vornhagen defeated Chip Shillingstad to earn a 14-4 decision. In the 126 weight class, sophomore Spencer Huber defeated Wyatt Larsen on a 15-5 decision.

Yankton didn't win another weight class the rest of the match.

However, Hage and the Yankton coaching staff was wrestler Hiram Alvarez at the 145 weight class, who had to take the place of Casey Skillingstad due to a lingering

injury.
"We knew Casey Skillingstad was going to be out of the line-up tonight, Hage said. "Our backup 145 pounder was injured too, the coaches and I discussed our best options there and we have been real impressed with Hiram in the practice room. He's very green and doesn't have a grasp quite yet, but what he does have, is a big heart. He will never give up on you.'

Alvarez ended up losing the contest 19-7 by decision. For Huron, at the 152 weight class, Nick Christensen received a pin. At 182,

Bison Escape USD 66-63

VERMILLION — What was almost a rather big win instead became a tough loss to

An experienced North Dakota State squad with a top-50 RPI overcame a spirited effort by the University of South Dakota men to pull out a 66-63 Summit League win Thursday night at the DakotaDome.

Sure, there could be ways to see a close game against the preseason favorite as a sign of progress, but the Coyotes (8-12, 3-3) had their chances to win such a game.

We had every opportunity to win that game, and that's the frustrating part," said interim head coach Joey James, whose team hosts South Dakota State on Satur-

"I feel bad for these guys, because they deserve it," he added. "But at some point, we've got to start catching some breaks in these close

It was the fifth consecutive win over the Covotes for the Bison since USD joined the Summit League, but by

far the closest margin. Having won by 26 points in Vermillion a year ago, NDSU (16-5, 5-1) was pushed to — literally — the final sec-

onds Thursday. Taylor Braun's drive and ensuing free throw with 34.1 seconds left pushed NDSU in front 64-63.

After a Coyote timeout, Trevor Gruis missed a pair of free throws that would have either tied the game or given the hosts the lead.

TrayVonn Wright hit two foul shots with 8.6 on the clock, and the Bison blocked a potential tying threepointer — a follow-up three hit off the rim at the buzzer.

And so, the Coyotes were dealt their sixth defeat this season by five points or fewer.

It's been a lot of games that I look at the stat sheet and see four points, three points, littered all over our record," said sophomore Adam Thoseby, who scored 11 points off the bench.

We just have to finish it; we have to find what it is we're missing to finish out those games.

One thing the Coyotes did find was an ability to slow down the nation's best shooting team.

The Bison shot 50 percent in the first half and took a 44-33 cushion into the break. They were, however, held to 27 percent in the second half when the Coyotes got

They shot really low in the second half, and that was definitely part of our energy, USD's Tyler Flack said. The sophomore had nine points and 10 rebounds.

USD went on a 19-8 run to tie the game at 52 midway through the second half, and the Coyotes later built a 61-56 lead with 4:08 to play — on six straight points by Brandon Bos.

Despite missing those last two free throws, Gruis, USD's senior center, finished with 16 points and eight rebounds. Bos added 14 points.
