The scholarship would have similar criteria as the YRAA Flight Training Scholarship such as (1) student must pass an Aviation Medical Exam before receiving scholarship funds, (2) student will write a letter about why they want the scholarship, (3) funds should be used within a 24month period, (4) flight training will be conducted at one of nine area airports (Hartington, Wayne, Bloomfield, Creighton, Springfield, Wagner, Parkston, Yankton and Vermillion), and (5) funds will be provided in increments (\$300 after passing written exam, \$300 after solo, \$300 after check ride, and \$100 after one-page story about training for the newsletter). The scholarship would not be used for instrument, commercial, or advanced training. High school counselors will be contacted to see if any students have expressed a desire to pursue a career in aviation.
