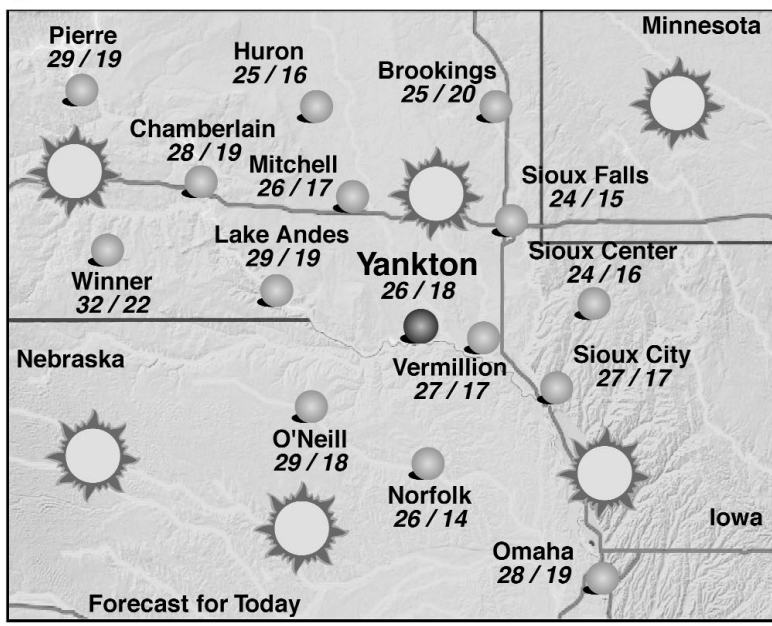

Food Hub Meetings In Area Begin Jan. 6

BROOKINGS — South Dakota is one of only a few states that have not developed a food hub as a model for marketing local food. This is about to change thanks to a recent grant the USDA Ag Marketing Services awarded SDSU Extension.

"This grant will give producers in southeastern South Dakota a chance to plan for their own food hub," said Kari O'Neill, SDSU Extension Community Development Field Specialist.

A food hub, O'Neill explained, is a means of aggregating and distributing local foods to restaurants and institutions interested in a constant supply of local foods for their establishments.

O'Neill has led a coordinated effort to research food hubs in other states and to assist producers in developing a plan that can work in South Dakota. She applied for the grant after producers in the southeastern quarter of the state indicated a commitment to planning for some way to collectively market fresh foods in a more coordinated effort.

The food hub model O'Neill would like to research further is one structured in Illinois which uses an LLC structure which includes 20-member farmers. The group began with only three member-farmers selling to a local grocer. Today

the group sells to many restaurants in the Chicago area, even though they are located two hours from the metro area.

SDSU Extension's one-year, \$25,000 planning grant is funded through the Local Food Promotion Program. In addition to producers, input for the planning will be gathered from many statewide resource providers, most of whom are part of the South Dakota Local Foods Collaborative. The first step in implementing the grant will be regional producer meetings hosted by local food producers.

Other pieces included in the planning grant are:

- Local food producers, resource providers and potential clients are offered the chance to participate in a field trip to Fairbury, Illinois, to visit the Stewards of the Land Food Hub. The trip is planned for early March and participants are being sought.
- The group will undergo a session on strategic planning starting February 7, in Mitchell to build their structure. Legal aid will be provided.
- A geo-mapping process will be used through the Planning Districts to give producers an idea of where potential aggregation sites could be feasible, and how transportation routes could be developed.
- Potential clients (restaurant chefs, food service managers, etc) will be invited to "Meet the Farmer" receptions this spring.
- Training will be provided by Dakota Rural Action on using an online marketing tool for listing and ordering food products.
- At the end of the year, if the project moves forward, the search will begin for a manager, and the results of the plan will be shared.

The date change avoided weather and scheduling problems in September, Hanten said. The location change opened up a larger, open venue in the center of town to attract bigger bands and more vendors.

"Memorial Park is such a beautiful part of town. It has great parking, and it's within walking distance for half of Yankton," he said. "And now, we have three major summer events with Ribfest in June, the Fourth of July celebration and Riverboat Days in August."

Hanten said he will resign from the board this month to make way for new blood. However, he will help line up the 2015 Ribfest.

"It will continue to be held on the first Saturday in June at Memorial Park. It will remain a one-day event this year, but the plan is to increase it to two days in future years," he said.

"(Rock band) Hairball will be coming back, and we will also feature the local bands. We will have many more food vendors, and we will have one large stage instead of two stages."

Ribfest's success proves the importance of acting boldly, Hanten said. He tries to share that message with others in Yankton and beyond.

"The best thing I can do is encourage people to take risks and try something new," he said. "We can't be afraid that something may not work. If it doesn't, then we just move on to the next thing."

LENDING A HELPING HAND

Hanten shows a passion for encouraging entrepreneurs, especially young people, to become a vital part of Yankton's mix.

"We want them to create businesses here rather than on the East or West Coast. We want to inspire them, to connect to what we are doing here so they don't feel they need to leave," he said.

"We have people who are starting businesses in their basements and online. Many of these things are invisible in our community. We want

to shine a light on the people who are doing cool things."

Yankton needs to realize its full potential and promote itself, Hanten said.

"You hear people say, it can't happen here in Yankton. I say, 'Why can't it?'" he said. "We have the river, lake and downtown. Yankton has a set of (historic) buildings that people would die for."

In addition, Yankton enjoys a strong, diverse economic and cultural base, Hanten said.

"We have strong medical, manufacturing, banking and tourism. You tie it together into one package, and you see that we're pretty special," he said.

"We're further ahead than other communities. There are a lot of things that are our strengths. Let's own them and make them grand. Let's tell our story."

CREATING OPPORTUNITIES

Hanten created businesses as a teenager, and he has taken his entrepreneurial spirit in new directions.

- He chairs Two Bridges Capital, a South Dakota-based angel fund providing capital for start-up businesses with a potential for high growth. The fund has 16 investors and looks at a variety of deals, particularly companies in South Dakota or willing to relocate here.
- Hanten has also worked with the national One Million Cups organization. The local programs meet at 9 a.m. Wednesdays in the Avera Professional Office Pavilion and focus on helping those with innovative ideas.
- "One Million Cups invites local entrepreneurs to give a six-minute presentation on their start-up company, including their problems," he said. "Then, we allow 20 minutes for others to give advice and to address those problems."

At a recent One Million

Cups meeting, a U.S. Property official announced the former downtown Yankton post office will be converted into 17 residential units, 3,000 square feet of retail space and parking.

In addition, the local One Million Cups discussions have raised the idea of creating shared work space for entrepreneurs.

With 15,000 residents, Yankton stands out among One Million Cups chapters, Hanten said. "I think we're the smallest community in the nation to have a One Million Cups program," he said.

- Hanten helped start a Friday morning coffee group at the Hy-Vee restaurant. The gatherings help create community and find ways to build a better business climate in Yankton, he said.
- Last March, Hanten founded Think 29, a media and events company focused on building the entrepreneurial and investor community in the northern Interstate 29 corridor. The company's premier event is Wire Me Awake, held in Vermillion.

Through Think 29, he has worked with leaders in other communities to promote the I-29 corridor from Fargo in the north to Yankton, Vermillion and Sioux City in the south. The corridor includes 18 universities, four technical schools, six venture capital firms and four angel funds.

"We're working to build bridges," Hanten said. "We get ideas from other cities. If Yankton has a need, Sioux City could help. And I believe Yankton and Vermillion need to work together much more. It would be 25,000 residents working together with all

sorts of strengths."

* For his latest venture, Hanten has just been named the first entrepreneur in residence for the University of South Dakota in Vermillion. He has been working with the business school's dean on the program.

"Many times, students have all sorts of theoretical knowledge. They need to be encouraged about the business they want to create," Hanten said. "There are a lot of bets that may pay off, but they need (the help of) a lot of expertise if they're going to hit a home run."

The USD position is part-time and won't affect Hanten's bar. "I will be on campus one day a week. Ben's is still my full-time business," he said.

Hanten said he doesn't hold any special insight into tackling the variety of projects, although it keeps him hopping.

"I'm not smarter than anybody else," he said. "But I am excited to be around people who talk the language of new ideas while having fun."

Hanten holds a passion for his hometown, making the Citizen of the Year honor even more meaningful to him.

"I love Yankton. I'm not sure if it's our humbleness, but we need to stop being afraid to say it," he said. "I'm

proud to live here, and I'm going to live here. I want to continue contributing to ways that make Yankton a little bit better."
