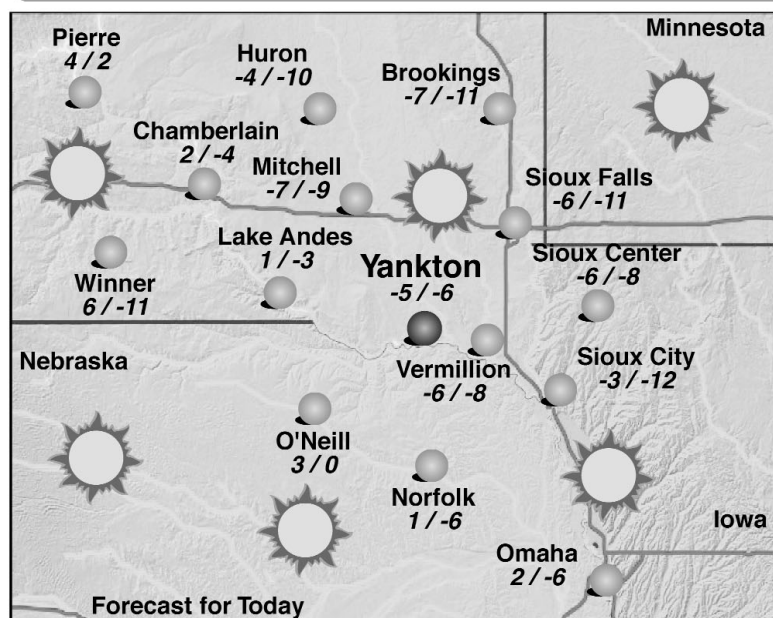

Climate Update Forecasts A Cold January

BROOKINGS — The Climate Prediction Center temperature and precipitation climate outlook released Jan. 1, 2015 shows cooler weather likely to make an extended stay, explained Laura Edwards, SDSU Extension climate field specialist. "There were some hints of this coming a couple of weeks ago, but now it is official," Edwards said.

many days where temperatures will struggle to make it above freezing, so additional checks on water supplies and heaters is also recommended," she said.

Based on body condition scoring, Edwards said producers will be able to monitor animal health to ensure they are receiving enough nutrition throughout the next couple of weeks. She added that because the climate forecast also appears to be mostly dry for the early to middle part of January, snow removal and moisture or mud in feedlots and as well as on animal coats will most likely not be an issue.

WARMER DAYS AHEAD

Based on the current outlook, Edwards said that by mid-month, the coldest weather will be behind us — at least for a while — and warmer and drier conditions should come across the state. "At that time feed rations can again be re-evaluated, as we look towards late winter and calving season to begin," Edwards said. To learn more, visit iGrow.org.
