PIERRE — The operator of the Missouri River marina at Pickstown said Thursday he's ready to start running the Yankton ma-

Members of the South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks Commission unanimously approved a 10-year lease with Chris Donlin to operate the state's concession at Lewis and

Clark Recreation Area.

Donlin told commissioners he would provide certified technicians for boat work and is looking for someone to run the restaurant at an upgraded level of service.

The state Division of Parks and Recreation struggled for more than a year to find a successor to current leaseholder Russ Marsh. After two rounds of seeking proposals, Donlin was the only businessman to step forward with an acceptable plan.

Donlin has run the Pickstown marina for two decades and his family has deep roots in the region. He said his grandparents homesteaded at Fort Randall.

We think the Lewis and Clark operation would be a good addition to it," he said. "We are a service-oriented business.'

City, County Building Boomed In '14

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Building permits issued in 2014 took center-stage during Thursday's meeting of the Yankton City/County Planning Commission — and the news was good at both the city and county levels.

Community Development Director Dave Mingo said he was happy to see the number of housing units rise, in addition to valuations.

One thing that happened in 2014 that's good, in addition to the valuations being up substantially to a more customary level at (\$31,193,679), is the number of housing

units," Mingo said. "That includes apartment units, single-family units and everything. It's a dwelling unit per census definition. We were in the 20s for three or four years and so we're kind of back to that 2008 and prior level with 56 units in 2014."

In comparison, 2013 saw 22 housing units and valuations totaling \$12,842,385. In all, 299 building permits were issued by the city in 2014.

Mingo told the *Press & Dakotan* the rise was largely due to expansion of existing businesses.

"We saw a lot of development from our primary employers," he said. "We had Wilson Trailer do a large expansion. We had

Avera do a large expansion with the Sister James facility; a motel; an apartment complex — so the commercial sector drove the improvement in values. The increase in housing also played a factor in that increase in values.

Yankton County zoning administrator Pat Garrity said the county also enjoyed a successful year for building permits.

"We had a very good year — it was the second best year we've had since we (started) doing permits in 2003," Garrity

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El Nino Possibilities Diminishing In Upper Midwest

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Despite months of anticipation, El Nino conditions may not come to fruition in the upper Midwest forecast.

During the year's first NOAA Central U.S. Climate Outlook webinar Thursday, Illinois state climatologist Jim Angel said the region hasn't been seeing the effects of a warmer Pacific Ocean yet.

"For the last year, we've been talking about the arrival of El Nino," Angel said. "It's still in the neutral phase right now. The sea surface temperatures are close to an actual El Nino event, but the circulation in the atmosphere hasn't reflected that. We haven't seen any kind of effect from the warm temperatures out in the Pacific Ocean at this point in time."

Angel said there's still a chance it will occur at reduced impact.

"There's still a 50-60 percent chance over the next two months, but then the neutral phase is expected to kick in after that," he said. "If we get it, it's going to be very short and it's going to be pretty
