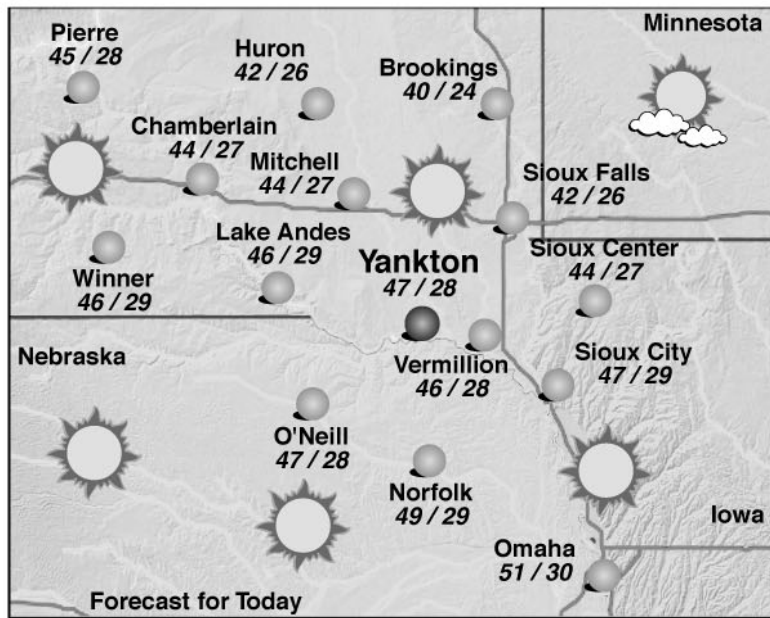

He is currently being held in the Polk County Jail. He walked away from Unit C, the minimum-security unit of the Jameson Annex to the South Dakota State Penitentiary, Jan. 15. At the time of the walkaway, Culp was serving two concurrent 10-year sentences with 8-years suspended on each sentence for grand theft in Yankton County.

Neb. HHS To Hold Hearing On Regs.

LINCOLN, Neb. — The Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services Division of Public Health will hold a hearing on proposed changes to regulations related to the licensure of hearing instrument specialists. The hearing will be held on Thursday, Jan. 22, at 9 a.m. CT, at the Nebraska State Office Building in Lincoln, 301 Centennial Mall South, lower level conference room A. The proposed changes are planned to reflect the provisions of the Hearing Instrument Specialists Practice Act and the Uniform Credentialing Act, including:
 • Qualifications for initial and initial temporary licenses;
 • Supervision of temporary licensees;
 • Examination requirements; and
 • Continuing competency requirements for license renewal. Interested persons are invited to submit written comments or to attend and comment at the hearing. Written comments must be postmarked or received by 5 p.m. CT the day of the hearing, and should be e-mailed to DHHS.RulesandRegs@nebraska.gov, faxed to 402-742-2382, or sent to DHHS Legal Services, 301 Centennial Mall South, P.O. Box 95026, Lincoln, NE 68509-5026. Copies of written comments and names of persons submitting them will be available after the hearing.
