In all the positions Brady Hale played on the football field for Yankton High School, he became a top offensive weapon at wide receiver and kicker.

Of the two, it's his kicking prowess that has led the senior to the Division I FCS level.

Hale, an all-state wide receiver and record-breaking kicker for the state champion Bucks, said Monday night he verbally committed to play football at South Dakota State.

"I connected really well with the players. And they have a good Christian environment," he told the Press & Dakotan on Monday night. "I felt at home there, and

just fell in love.' The 6-foot-4, 195-pound Hale set YHS program

records in most points in a season, most field goals (10) and tied for the longest field goal (53). Of those 10 field goals he hit for the undefeated Bucks, five were from

at least 40 yards.

He was also a top offensive weapon for record-setting quarterback Mason Strahl. Hale caught 40 passes for 490 yards and five touchdowns.

But it's his kicking and punting exploits that eventually earned him a scholarship from SDSU — the University of South Dakota also made an

offer. "They (SDSU) talked about receiver a little bit, but it's probably just kicking," he said. "That's definitely my passion.'

Hale made his decision after spending the weekend in Brookings on an official visit.

There, he and the other recruits got to walk through the Dykhouse Student-Athlete Center as well as around Coughlin-Alumni Stadium, which is undergoing an overhaul and will completed in time for the 2016 season.

"Some of the facilities are second to none," Hale said. "That was definitely a bonus, but it wasn't the only factor."

Hale will join former Yankton standouts Kellen Soulek and Lane Sawatkze on the football roster for the Jackrabbits, who have made three consecutive trips to the FCS playoffs — reaching the

second round each time. In the middle of his senior season on the Yankton boys' basketball team, Hale was, however, especially relieved to get his college decision out of the way.

"It's big," he said. "I feel like a weight's been lifted on my chest.

"Now I can focus on finishing out high school strong, and enjoying it with my teammates.'

Hale will sign his National Letter of Intent on National Signing Day, which is Feb. 4. Commitments are not binding until athletes sign their letter.

# To Improve To 25-0 For Bucks

For the second time in a week, Spencer Huber found himself down 5-0 in a match. And once again, the Yank-

ton High School junior found a way to keep his perfect record intact.

In one of two matches featuring ranked wrestlers, Huber recorded a third-period pin to highlight the home team's action at Monday night's Eastern South Dakota Conference dual against Brookings at the Summit Center

Huber, who earlier this season reached 100 career wins, moved to 25-0 on the season with a pin over ninthranked Kayde Bartels in their 132-pound showdown.

'Ît definitely gets me some experience," Huber said after the dual, won by Brookings



'Later in the season, those are what I'll see; those guys at the top of the food chain."

In their match, Bartels jumped out to a 5-0 lead after two rounds, but Huber flipped him over to get the pin 21 seconds into the third round.

Huber had a similar battle last weekend at the Harrisburg Invitational, ultimately winning the 126-pound title. "He needs those types of

matches," Yankton head coach Ryan Hage said.

The Yankton school record for pins in a season is 26, and Monday night's was Huber's 18th this season. It might not have happened, though, Hage said.

We could've kept him out, but we knew that it'd be a tough match for him," the coach said. "And give that kid (Bartels) credit, he put Spencer in some dangerous situations.'

Of the 14 weight classes in the hour-long dual, nine were contested, including three open wins for the Bobcats and two for the Bucks.

The only other match featuring ranked wrestlers was at 113 pounds, where secondranked Josh Puppe of Brook-ings blanked Cody Vornhagen 12-0.

Injury and illness to three regular varsity wrestlers forced Yankton to shift some JV faces onto the showcase mat.

"Any time you start talking about that, it can be a little tough," Hage said.

# **Basketball: Lancer Women Find Their Spark**

# MMC Takes 7-1 Run Into Final Month Of Season

At one point in mid-December, the Mount Marty College women's basketball team was searching for a spark.

Something — anything — to dig out of a 2-6 start to the Great Plains Athletic Conference season.

'We told the girls, 'I know what your aspirations are, and ours are probably even higher," said head coach Tom Schlimgen, who has a record of 124-82 in seven seasons at MMC.

And that's still not out of the picture." Why? Put simply: Mount Marty has turned the corner.

Following a win Sunday afternoon, the Lancers (14-7, 5-7) have now won seven of their last eight games — three of those wins coming in Great Plains Athletic Conference action. And their lone loss in that stretch was on a buzzer-beater at Briar Cliff.

The GPAC has four teams ranked in the top 25, but of those seven outside the rankings, Mount Marty is perhaps playing the best ball of late.

"Our kids are having fun, and that's a big part of it," Schlimgen said.

While quick to point out that there are still eight league games remaining, the Lancer coaches and players would also tell you the middle of the GPAC standings are quite muddled.

"If you look at the GPAC, you've got the top two, and then in the middle it's anyone's game," senior post Cheyenne Lambley said.

Undefeated Morningside, the nation's

No. 1 team, leads the conference at 11-0, while Concordia (12-1), Briar Cliff (7-4) and Hastings (7-4) are also ranked in the top 25.

Doane also sits at 7-4, while Northwestern, Dakota Wesleyan and Mount Marty all have five wins. Last season, the GPAC sent four teams to the NAIA National Tournament, and that's likely the same number to make it this season.

First things first, the Lancers — who last played in the national tournament in 2011 - just want to keep their momentum rolling.

"We're flowing together out there really well, and it's not just one person," senior guard April Winne said. "And it's not just on one side of the ball.'

While ranking sixth in the league in scoring defense per game (68.7), Mount Marty is the GPAC's third-best offensive unit (77.6). And that's thanks to the nation's third-best three-point shooting team, with an average of 10 three-pointers made per game.

Not bad for a team picked ninth in the pre-season poll.

"At times we play with a little bit of a chip on our shoulder," Lambley said. "We know not many people probably expect us to make a run.

The run they're already on, though, has the Lancers in a position to be at least thinking big picture.

"We've got a good team, and we know that," Lambley said. "We just want to make a statement at the end of the season."

That stretch begins Wednesday night at
