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Tax Plan Unveiled

Ricketts Emphasizes Taxes, Jobs, Education In First State Of The State

LINCOLN, Neb. — Nebraska Gov. Pete Ricketts called on lawmakers Thursday to lower property taxes statewide while expanding tax breaks for farmers, ranchers and military retirees.

The new Republican governor unveiled his tax plan along with job and education initiatives in his first State of the State address

In a speech focused heavily on the economy, Ricketts recommended a slowdown in state government spending increases to pay for the tax reductions. His proposed budget would lower the annual growth rate to about 3.1 percent annually over two years, down from the traditional 5 percent yearly average.

ESD Food Buying Group Expands

For Sandi Kramer, child nutrition supervisor for the Yankton School District (YSD), keeping food costs low is a challenge as she juggles with meeting the nutritional standards set at both the state and federal level.

In an effort to help reduce costs, she and the food directors from Harrisburg and Brandon Vallev joined together three years ago to form the ESD Food Buying Group. Now, because of the success they have had with the program, it is adding Brookings High School, as well.

The initial buying group was kept small in order to work out the "bugs," Kramer said but now is the time to expand.

"We are finding that the more volume the better, so we have asked the Brookings School District to join," Kramer said.

Big Plans In Process For Local Museum

A town square, specialized events and traveling exhibits are a few of the visions that Crystal Nelson and the board of directors of the Yankton County Historical Society and the Dakota Territorial Museum have for the Mead Building, which is scheduled to be the museum's new home in 2018.

Nelson said that the new museum will be something for the entire family. Kids will have hands-on exhibits alongside exhibits that will interest mom, dad, grandpa and grandma.

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Ability Building Services (ABS) of Yankton is celebrating 40 years of growth and service this month.

To commemorate the anniversary, ABS will be having an open house from 4-6 p.m. Thursday Jan. 29 at 909 West 23rd St.

This private not-for-profit community agency provides pre-vocational activities, vocational training, residential training and other supports and services as needed to people with disabilities.

ABS currently supports 138 people with services.

Staff members at ABS, many of whom have been there more than 30 vears, will say that over the past 40 years, the agency has evolved into

something much more than what it

was at the beginning. "When I first started here, we were taking care of people and we were making those decisions in their life," long-time staff member and service coordinator Vivian Bakke said. "Now, the people are making their own decisions. It's all about what each person wants. It's not

'What is good for one person is good for everyone."

Talk began in the early 1970s of starting a sheltered workshop in Yankton to provide services for people with developmental disabilities.

"A lot of people were institution-alized at this time," said executive di-rector Beth Kathol. "But services like

ABS were progressing."


