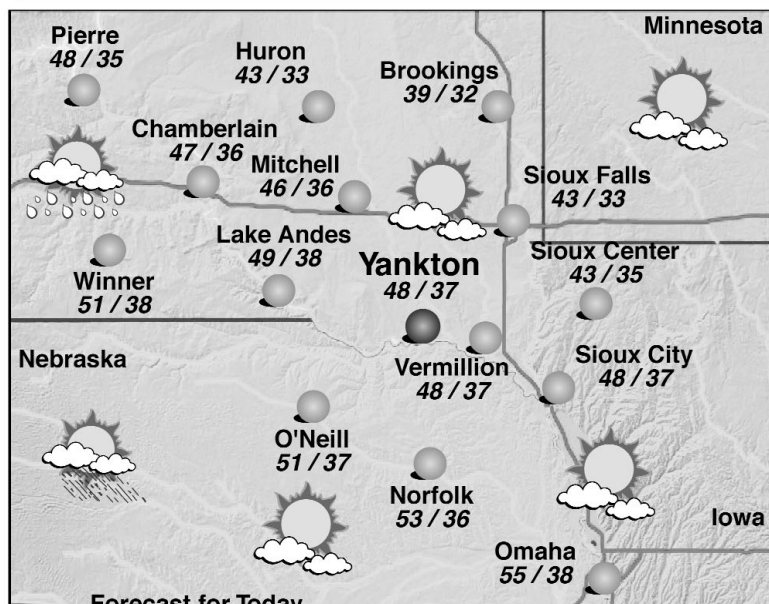

An ordinance for the licensure and regulation of horse-drawn carriages in the city of Yankton will be discussed during Monday night's meeting of the City Commission. Additionally, the commission will consider minor changes to the order for a new fire truck, a contract to replace library circulation software and the purchase of a flusher truck.

The City Commission is set to meet at 7 p.m. Monday at the Technical Education Center.

Friday, Jan. 30, marks the first day petitions may be circulated for the commission's three vacancies in the April 14 municipal election. Commissioners Dave Carda, David Knoff and Pauline Akland's current terms will expire. Carda and Knoff told the *Press & Dakotan* they intend to run for reelection while Akland said she will decide by mid-February.

Law Enforcement To Get Police Cameras

PIERRE — Attorney General Marty Jackley said today that the Clay County Sheriff's Office and the Vermillion Police Department have been awarded \$27,348.60 for body worn police cameras to be used in drug investigations.

The money was awarded out of the Drug Control Fund. The award will assist local law enforcement in drug control and apprehension purposes.

"The Drug Control Fund allows law enforcement to combat controlled substance abuse by funding local programs with monies seized from drug arrests," said Jackley. "If a local law enforcement agency determines that body worn cameras will assist then I support partnering with the use of monies derived from criminal profits and activities."

"Body worn cameras will be valuable in helping our officers in Vermillion and Clay County to demonstrate the facts of a case in court and remove any doubt. They will also help resolve any use of force concerns, which could occur during custodial arrest situations," said Clay County Sheriff Andy Howe.

USDA Rural Development Seeks Applicants For Energy Grants And Loans In Rural Areas

LINCOLN, Neb. — USDA Rural Development is seeking applications for the Rural Energy for America Program (REAP). REAP is available to agricultural producers and rural small-for-profit businesses to complete energy efficiency improvements or install a renewable energy system to their current farm or business operations.

Grants and guaranteed loans may be used for the purchase and installation of energy efficiency equipment and renewable energy systems, such as heating, ventilating, and air conditioning (HVAC) units, lighting, windows, pivots or sub-surface drip tape systems as well as, irrigation engines or motors, variable frequency drives, grain dryers, geothermal systems, solar panels, wind turbines, and anaerobic digesters.

Grants are for 25 percent of the total eligible project costs, and guaranteed loans are for up to 75 percent of the total eligible project costs. Rural is defined as cities with a population of

less than 50,000. Applications are to be submitted to your local Rural Development office no later than close of business, 4:30 p.m. April 30, 2015 and June 30, 2015. All applications submitted are selected based on a competitive scoring process, which is outlined within the application packet.

REAP, authorized by the Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2014, (Farm Bill) is designed to help agricultural producers and rural small businesses to reduce energy costs and consumption and help meet the Nation's critical energy needs. USDA is accepting the following applications:

- Energy Audit and Renewable Energy Development Assistance Grants (for State, Tribal, or Local Government, and Councils to conduct energy audits to assist agricultural producers and rural small businesses) until Feb. 12, 2015;
- Energy Efficiency Improvements and Renewable Energy Systems GRANT

applications, combination grant and guaranteed loan applications until April 30, 2015, and June 30, 2015;

- Energy Efficiency Improvements and Renewable Energy Systems guaranteed loan only applications will be accepted continuously and compete monthly.
