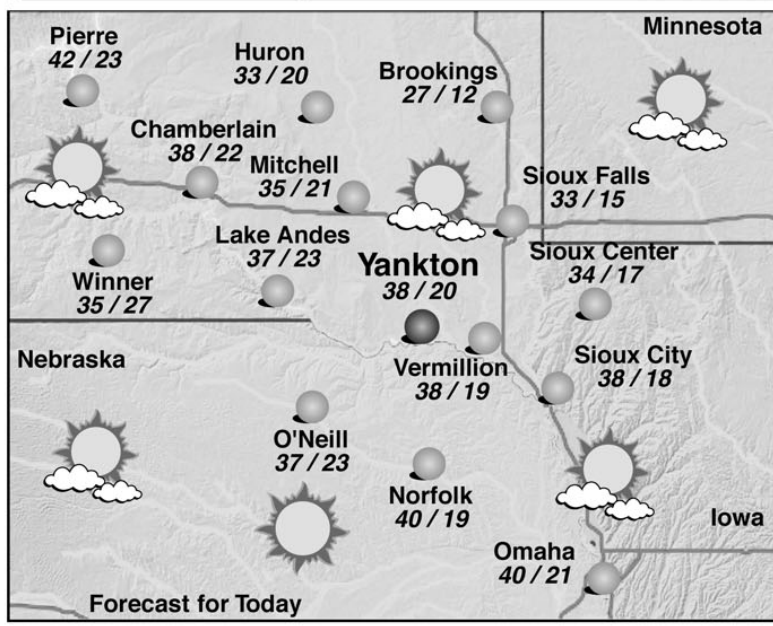

WALL STREET RECAP

NEW YORK (AP) — The U.S. stock market ended lower on Wednesday as investors weighed the latest policy statement from the Federal Reserve and the implications of oil prices sinking to the lowest level in nearly six years.

The Nasdaq composite lost 43.50 points, or 0.9 percent, to 4,637.99.

FOR THE WEEK:

The Dow is down 481.23 points, or 2.7 percent. The S&P 500 index is down 49.66 points, or 2.4 percent. The Nasdaq is down 119.88 points, or 2.5 percent.

FOR THE YEAR:

The Dow is down 631.70 points, or 3.5 percent. The S&P 500 index is down 56.74 points, or 2.8 percent. The Nasdaq is down 98.06 points, or 2.1 percent.
