Lancaster, meanwhile, is director of business development at South Dakota Innovation Partners and has depth of experience in launching research-derived innovations, particularly in the life sciences and agriculture markets. She earned her B.S. in biology (2010) and M.S. in Biomedical Engineering (2012) from USD and is Lean Six Sigma Certified.

These top entrepreneurs, and future EIRs, will be available for one-on-one mentoring and/or speaking engagements to classes and student organizations. They are available to provide insight and guidance to

USD students and faculty as they develop products and services with an economic impact for Vermillion, the region, and South Dakota.

'Innovation and Entrepreneurship is a strategic focus area for both the Beacom School of Business and the USD," stated Venky Venkatachalam, dean of the Beacom School of Business. 
