# **Encounter Center To Feature The** 'Missouri River Creatures' Program Feb. 8

SIOUX CITY, Iowa — The Sioux City Lewis & Clark Interpretive Center will present "Creatures of the Missouri River" with fisheries biologist and outdoors photographer Sam Stukel at 2 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 8 at the Betty Strong Encounter Center. Admission will be free.

The audience will learn about some of the rare, unique and important species that make their homes in the local Missouri River's underwater world.

"The Missouri River is full of interesting characters: prehistoric relics; heavily armored super-predators; eatanything omnivores; and fish that grow huge by eating tiny plankton," he says.

The fisheries biologist will shed light on the world of the pallid sturgeon and a few other creatures that share the Missouri River's muddy waters.

"No species' fate is tied more closely to its Missouri River habitat than the pallid sturgeon's," says Stukel. "These are ancient, odd-looking fish facing an uphill battle against extinction."

A fisheries biologist with the South Dakota Dept. of Game, Fish and Parks, Stukel is on the river more than 100 days each year. His work has

deepened his appreciation for all that the Missouri River offers, especially in the Yankton area that straddles the line between the reservoirs of the upper river and the engineered channel of the lower river.

The Gregory native earned a bachelor's degree at Mount Marty College in Yankton, where he spent many evenings fishing in the Gavins Point Dam tailrace or exploring the shores of Lewis and Clark Lake. Those experiences inspired him to choose a career working with the river.

After an internship with the South Dakota Dept. of Game, Fish and Parks on Lake Oahe, Stukel earned a master's degree in fishery biology at South Dakota State University, Brookings. In his first position he was based at Lake Andes, where he evaluated the water quality of streams flowing into Lewis and Clark Lake.

"I gained new hands-on

appreciation for threats to the clean water we all take for granted."

Štukel has fished, boated, hunted and explored the Missouri River year-round since his youth. "The river was an endless source of entertainment for a boy who loved nothing more than outdoor adventures."

Some 20 years ago Stukel began to photograph land-scapes, wildlife and people. As his hobby progressed, he was increasingly drawn to Missouri River landscapes. Encouraged by reaction to his photography, he committed a year to shooting river images. The results have been described as "stun-

ning." The Betty Strong Encounter Center and adjoining Sioux City Lewis & Clark Interpretive Center comprise a private, non-profit cultural complex built and sustained by Missouri River Historical Development, Inc.
