Gayville-Volin Girls Building On Post-Season Run

GAYVILLE - A solid regular season for the Gayville-Volin girls' basketball team turned into a historic run for the Raiders, as the team became the first basketball team — boys' or girls' from Gayville-Volin to win a district title. They took it a step further with an exciting victory in the region final, earning the school's first-ever state basketball berth.

This season the Raiders have built on last year's finish, and take a 12-1 record into their matchup with Canistota today (Saturday) in the Tri-Valley Conference girls' basketball Classic at Laddie E. Cimpl Arena in Yankton.

The difference between the Raiders' 2013-14 team and 2014-15 team was evident as early as team camps this past summer, said second-year head coach Matt Malloy.

"In summer camps they were usually just happy to be there. Now they're competing," he said. "They have a lot more confidence in what they do."

That competitive spirit was not just in the returning regulars for the Raiders, said senior Kelia Barta.

"We had quite a few players that didn't get as much playing time last year work a lot harder this year to help out the team as a whole, said Barta, who averages 13 points and five assists per game.

That work has paid off in victories. This year's Raiders have won few games that last year's 17-10 team would not have, according to Malloy.

"They know how to win now," he said. "We lost seven (in the regular season) last year and, in three or four of those, we were up in the fourth. We were down to Tripp-Delmont-Armour and a nail-biter against Hartington-Newcastle, and we won those.

"Last year, the year before, we weren't winning those games.'

Last year's finish and this year's success have meant that the Raiders don't "sneak up" on anyone anymore.

"It's shown us that we are going to have obstacles before we get to state," said junior Genny Clark, the team's leading scorer at 16.8 points per game. "It's going to be a challenge every single game. None of our games are going to be easy.'

One of those "not easy" games came Jan. 9, when Irene-Wakonda won in Gayville for the Raiders' only setback so far this season.

"Losses are not always bad if you learn from it," Malloy said. "It was a reality check for us. But we've thought about that game a lot and would like to have another crack at them.

Besides Clark and Barta, sophomore Laura Nelson has cracked double figures, averaging 10 points per game. Sophomore Megan Hirsch, who ripped off games of 17 and 10 rebounds in the state

'I'm the old guy on this team, but it's on the younger guys to keep building like this for next year," he said. First, however, the Lancers have


five regular season games remaining, beginning next Wednesday against Morningside. "We have to pick out the things we did well, especially in the sec-
