CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures were mixed Wednesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for September delivery jumped 23.25 cents to \$4.8025 a bushel, while September corn soared 29.5 cents to \$3.6275 a bushel and oats for July delivery climbed 6.5 cents to \$2.55 a bushel. November soybeans dropped 9.5 cents to \$9.025 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef futures advanced and pork futures traded mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

August live cattle rose 1.27 cents to 90.02 cents a pound; August feeder cattle inched up 0.18 cent to \$1.1305 a pound; August lean hogs added 0.7 cent to 81.65 cents a pound; and July pork bellies lost 1.7 cents to 99.5 cents a pound.

BP Fined For Misreporting Gas Output

DENVER (AP) — The Interior Department has fined BP America \$5.2 million for allegedly submitting false reports about energy production on an Indian reservation in Colorado.

The Interior Department said Wednesday that the U.S. unit of BP PLC repeatedly misreported royalty rates for natural gas on Southern Ute Indian tribal lands. Interior spokesman Patrick Etchart said BP was not taking more natural gas than reported. Instead, BP at times reported erroneous royalty rates, or listed gas coming from the wrong wells, he said.

BP America spokesman Daren Beaudo said most of the errors came when BP listed royalty payments for "natural gas" instead of "coal-bed methane gas," a more specific designation with a different royalty schedule. The errors led BP to underpay the Southern Utes about \$200,000, which has been repaid, Beaudo said. Beaudo couldn't say how long the error went on.

Tribal leaders didn't return calls seeking comment.

Etchart said the \$5.2 million fine is in addition to the underreported royalties and would be split between the federal government and the Southern Utes.

Southern Ute auditors said they discovered incorrect reports in 2007 and reported them to BP, which blamed the misreporting on a computer glitch and promised to make changes. However, BP's reporting errors continued after the audit pointed out the problems, leading to the fine.

"We are committed to collecting every dollar due from energy production that occurs on federal and American Indian lands, and accurate reporting is crucial to that effort," said Michael R. Bromwich, head of the Interior Department's Bureau of Ocean Energy Management, Regulation and Enforcement. The ongoing errors indicated the misreporting was "knowing or willful," Bromwich said in a written statement.

Yankton City Manager Doug Russell said part of the project involves the trail that runs along Eighth Street and he wanted to be sure the work on it does not conflict with a future city project.

"They only have a portion that they're going to do, so the city is looking at rejuvenating the remainder of that, and we're looking at doing that in concrete rather than the asphalt that's currently there. We just want the state to coordinate alongside of us so that it's all the same material," he said.

Yankton Area Engineer Ron Peterson assured Russell that this had already been accounted for.

Heermann discussed several other projects that involved resurfacing and structure work:

- On South Dakota Highway 25 from the junction with South Dakota Highway 50 to the junction with U.S. Highway 18 — excluding the town of Scotland.
- On South Dakota Highway 50 from east Fourth Street from the south junction of U.S. Highway 81 to Ferdig Avenue in Yankton.

Springfield's city finance officer told the DOT reps that her community "still wants to be put on the five-year plan."

"The highway needs to be lowered," she said. "The 1939 culverts should be replaced. The main thing that really needs to get done is the culvert on the left side of town. It definitely needs to be replaced...."

"You did some improvements and it did help, but it needs more."
