Highway Patrol Plans Holiday Enforcement

PIERRE — The South Dakota Highway Patrol plans a combination of sobriety checkpoints and high-visibility patrols to help keep state roads safe for Fourth of July holiday travelers.

The July 4 weekend traditionally is a busy one on South Dakota highways, so drivers need to use extra caution as they travel, says Major Randy Hartley, acting superintendent of the South Dakota Highway Patrol.

The official holiday crash reporting period begins at 6 p.m. on Friday and ends at 11:59 p.m. on Monday. The holiday period is included in the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's "Drunk Driving: Over the Limit, Under Arrest" campaign. In South Dakota, the Highway Patrol has sobriety checkpoints scheduled in seven different counties between July 1-5.

"If we catch you drinking, we will arrest you," Hartley said. "We would rather not have to do that, and if every motorist makes responsible decisions and follows the laws, we won't have to."

Johnson Honors Wakonda On 125th

WASHINGTON — Sen. Tim Johnson (D-S.D.) recognized the City of Wakonda on the 125th anniversary of its founding this month. Johnson entered a statement in the Congressional Record highlighting the milestone.

"Small communities like Wakonda are the foundation of our state," Johnson said. "I am honored to highlight this milestone for the community with a statement in the Congressional Record."

The full text of the Congressional Record Statement from Johnson is:

"Mr. President, today I rise in order to pay tribute to the 125th anniversary of Wakonda, South Dakota. The town calls itself 'The Good Life Town' and I would have to agree. With a strong sense of community and a welcoming spirit, Wakonda is a wonderful place to call home.

"Wakonda was founded when the North Western Railroad expanded its line in northwestern Clay County. Surveyors originally planned out the town, calling it Summit, but when negotiations on land price fell through, the town was moved southwest. The building crews stayed on local farms and completed their work by the end of the year. General William Beadle is credited with suggesting the name of Wakonda, a Santee Sioux word meaning 'wonderful.' The town quickly sprouted, with many new businesses popping up in the coming years.

"To celebrate Wakonda's historical achievement, the town will join together for a weekend of activities. With a golf tournament, kids carnival, and artistic exhibits, this town is sure to have a great time celebrating. I am proud to recognize Wakonda on reaching this milestone, and wish them all the best in their future."

The band Go Figure will play at 7:45 p.m. at the Riverside Park amphitheater. The fireworks begin afterward, with 106.3 KVHT providing the musical background during the display.

Area communities aren't waiting until the Fourth of July, launching activities ranging from toilet races, bull riding and a duck regatta to frog jumping and Irish dancing.

CENTERVILLE — Saturday's events include races, a fundraising supper, toilet bowl races, the firemen's street dance with local classic rock band "Autumn Road" and fireworks at Peder Larsen Park starting at sunset. On Sunday, a community worship service will be held at the city park.

CROFTON, Neb. — On Friday, the Crofton Bluejays square off against the Wynot Expos in an amateur baseball game, followed by fireworks. Saturday's activities include a golf tournament, alumni

banquet and street dance with the band "Go Figure."

DELMONT — Sunday's activities feature "Kids' Day" activities, a free watermelon feed, an amateur baseball game between Delmont and Corsica-Stickney, and fireworks.

FREEMAN — Saturday's events begin at noon with baseball and softball games. That night, the Freeman Black Sox take on Tabor in amateur baseball followed by the fireworks display.

MENNO — Friday's alley dance features "Damn' Strait." Saturday features a road race, the 11 a.m. parade, an amateur baseball game between Menno and Scotland, and the fireworks display. On Sunday, the Menno-Olivet All School Reunion will hold a tailgate party at the gym.

NIOBRARA, Neb. — The alumni golf tournament will be held Friday, while the social hour and banquet will be held Saturday at the school.

PARKSTON — Sunday features a community lunch, family entertainment with "Mike Bliss and the Incredible Bliss Brothers" and the new pool slide dedication. The

evening features the amateur baseball game between the Parkston Mudcats and the Parkston Rock Bass followed by fireworks.

SPRINGFIELD — Saturday's activities start with the fun run-walk, co-ed volleyball, and horse-shoe and bean bag tournaments. VERMILLION — Sunday's activities include "Fun In The Sun" at the swimming pool, the annual duck regatta, and "Celebrate in the Park" at Barstow Park with music by the Outback Band; the annual Hy-Vee hot dog eating champi-

onship, and fireworks.

WAKONDA — The Clay County community celebrates its 125th anniversary today (Thursday) through Sunday.

Today kicks off with downtown music, a pageant and karaoke. Friday's activities include a golf scramble, vintage fashion show, tractor show, kids carnival, swimming and water slides, and chainsaw sculpture. The evening offers downtown music, a poker run, pageant and 9 p.m. street dance with "Gotha Cover'd" in front of the Legion Hall.

Saturday's schedule features the 10 a.m. parade on Main Street, Irish dancing, entertainment in the park, school tours, all-school reunion and banquet, and street dance with the "Poker Alice" band.

The celebration concludes Sunday with Mass at St. Patrick's Catholic Church and a community church service, free community pancake breakfast and musical entertainment at the school.

"One man was sleeping in his bed and woke up to find water rising up to his mattress," she said. "By the time he was able to get out of his house, it was up to his neck. Anyone who had anything in their basements for the most part has lost everything that was there."

The waters were flowing so fast through the small community that the currents tore out fences, ripped propane tanks from their foundations and pushed in walls on buildings.

"It is just overwhelming, you don't know where to start," Archambeau said. "At first we just wanted to make sure everyone was OK and was getting any treatments they needed. We had several people on dialysis that the sheriff and rescue personnel got out so they could get their treatments. Then we had to make sure that everyone had shelter and food. We

put up many of the families at the hotel and made sure they had food for three meals a day, too."

Once the initial reaction of making sure all community members were safe and the floodwaters receded, the task of cleaning up and identifying what people in the community needed to begin to recover began.

"Even the homes that didn't get water in the basements now have sewage backing up into them," Archambeau said. "The Tribal Indian School is flooded, they lost all of their vehicles, the homes, the fire trucks — they were all ruined. The pig farm outside of town that we didn't want so close to our school in the first place, all of the run-off from there was washed into our town, into our school."

Making issues even more difficult for recovery operations was the fact that the Yankton Sioux Tribal building in Marty was one of the hardest hit in the community.

"The Tribal Headquarters are still unusable," Archambeau said. "There is no electricity because

the wall where the electricity comes into the building was pushed in by the water. Our computers are ruined. Our files are gone. People are working from their homes trying to do the best we can, but it is difficult."

Perhaps one of the hardest things for Archambeau to understand is the lack of response from outside the community.

"The Wagner hospital and Avera Sacred Heart in Yankton have been great, bringing us water, food, clothing," she said. "But we set up a fund at the Commercial State Bank and we have only had one donation so far. The Business and Claims Committee is doing as much as we can, trying to help everyone and we are working as hard as we can. We are already hearing complaints that we are not doing enough. We just don't have enough money to do what is needed, but it has to be done."

Bryan Slaba, CEO/Administrator of the Wagner Community Memorial Hospital/Avera said the effects of the flood are just devastating to see.

"You go by a building and you

can see the rushes left behind from the flooding 6-7 feet up on buildings," he said. "Homes are still being inspected and repaired to make livable. Last I heard there were still 15 or so families that were displaced."

Slaba said that the Wagner and Yankton community hospitals are working together to do a food/clothing drive to try to help alleviate some of the most urgent needs.

"We have about 400 cases of water and 4-5 pickup truckloads of clothing and food that we will be delivering tomorrow (Thursday)," he said. "But it is just the start of what they need. We will still be collecting at both hospitals anything that anyone wants to donate."
