Neb. Woman Dies Before State Pay Out

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — An 88-year-old Omaha woman who was fighting in court for \$447,000 in back pay from the state of Nebraska has died.

One of Lucille Kilgore's lawyers, Ray Aranza, says her death on Saturday won't end her fight with the state. He said Thursday that Kilgore's estate would continue with the appeal.

Kilgore had spent nearly 30 years typing reports and handling other duties as a volunteer at the state's juvenile parole office in Omaha. She never asked to be paid for her work.

But in 2004, she sued the state for back pay and won in 2008. The state appealed, arguing that Kilgore was a volunteer, not an employee.

Bertsch said the hiking and multi-use trails are as busy as ever. The parks have seen an increase in family reunions and get-together this summer, too.

"It provides a good opportunity that people can take their vacation and relax and have a good time," he said.

Still, the poor weather has brought people to indoor activities close to their camping spots at the lake area.

Visitation at the Gavins Point National Fish Hatchery and Aquarium has been up about 5 to 10 percent, said curator Marv Ehlers.

"We're one of the things people can do when it's raining," Ehlers said. "Rain showers bring a lot of people in who might have been out at the beach or boating."

Out of the approximately 800 visitors a day, about 80 percent of the hatchery and aquarium's traffic is from South Dakota, Nebraska, Iowa and Minnesota, he said.

But poor weather may not be the only reason people are spending more time indoors this summer.

"We've got all new decorations this year in the tanks," Ehlers said. "Instead of concrete tanks like in the past, they're sculpted rock. We have all new lighting and plumbing, too. We've had a lot of comments that people like the improvements."

He added that the improvements have made the aquarium more natural looking, enhancing the learning experience.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has seen an increase of visitors at the Lewis and Clark Visitor Center and Gavins Point Dam tours on days with extreme weather, too.

"If we have any really hot or really rainy weather, the visitation indoors goes way up," said Park Ranger Karla Zeutenhorst. "When it's cruddy out, people come in."

Still, Zeutenhorst said that overall, indoor visitation numbers have been down a little bit from last year. She predicted that this summer's visitation numbers for the Lewis and Clark Visitor Center are off about 10 to 15 percent from typical years.

"Last year was a big year for some reason," she said. "In the visitor center, we had the most visitation since 2005."

And while tours at Gavins Point Dam are steady, they have had fewer numbers of people on each tour compared to other years.

"That can have lots of different factors. It can be weather, it can be economy. It would be hard to say what would cause the indoor activity to go down," she said.

While camping numbers keep rising, Zeutenhorst said that increase may cut into the overall number of day trips to indoor facilities like the Lewis and Clark Visitor Center or Gavins Point Dam.

"People who would normally take day trips to the visitor center and other places of interest like that may not be taking those trips maybe because of gas prices or something like that," she said.
