clients since 2007. An expert appointed to review progress at BSDC said it took nearly a year after some deaths before reports were finalized.

Jodi Fenner, the state's developmental disabilities director, said a second committee of medical professionals has been formed to review deaths, which could increase its work production.

Also incomplete is a review that Schaefer said a year ago two

nurses with no connection to BSDC would do.

Schaefer said at the time that part of the job of the nurses would be to review how the conditions of the medically fragile she forced to leave BSDC were managed after they left. The intent of the review, she said, was not to determine whether the move affected their health conditions.

Schaefer said she decided later not to have the reviews done because they would have been redundant. She said she was getting regular information she was satisfied with from state staff.

An official at a national advocacy group sharply criticized

Nebraska's handling of the move of the medically fragile and apparent lack of knowledge about the potential problems associated with transitions.

It is widely known in the field of treatment for developmental disabilities that moves can cause what is known as "transfer trauma," causing serious health conditions and increasing the chances of death, said Tamie Hopp, a director at Voices of the Retarded, a national advocacy group that has monitored the issue in Nebraska.

An Associated Press review of deaths of BSDC residents and former residents shows that the move of the medically fragile in

February 2009 and moves that occurred the year before may have had severe consequences.

— The death rate among the group of 47 medically fragile — 12 who died within a year of the move — was more than nine times higher than the death rate among all BSDC residents both in 2008, when medically fragile people still lived at BSDC, and 2009.

— The death rate among residents moved out of the center in 2008 before the order to remove the medically fragile was more than five times higher than the rate at BSDC that same year. In 2008, when seven of BSDC's 267 residents died, 74 others were discharged from the institution.

extremely cooperative, and we developed a good relationship."

Cantin also investigated the 1970s shooting deaths of two FBI agents, spending six weeks on the Pine Ridge reservation.

The time with the FBI remains a major highlight for Cantin. However, he has performed other roles during his lifetime, mostly in Yankton. He has taught English at Yankton High School and Yankton College, served as Yankton police chief, and accepted the role as the first full-time criminal justice professor at Mount Marty College.

He has also served on state boards dealing with corrections and chemical abuse. He continues working as spiritual director at the Keystone retreat for chemical dependency and gambling.

Cantin recently attended a spiritual retreat at Sacred Heart Monastery in Yankton. The retreat allowed Cantin to reflect on the many twists in the path of his life.

The Jefferson native received his bachelor's degree from Yankton College and his master's degree from the University of South Dakota in Vermillion, both in English.

He taught and coached football at Yankton High School. Outside of school, he coached the Yankton Lakers to the 1969 state amateur baseball championship.

Cantin then taught at Pershing College in Beatrice, Neb. After the school closed, he taught English at Yankton College.

During conversations with a friend, Cantin learned more about the FBI. Cantin's wife, Judy, also had a classmate in the FBI. The more he learned, Cantin became even more intrigued by the idea.

"I was happy at Yankton College, but I applied on a lark," he said.

Cantin was accepted into the FBI. He served assignments in Washington, D.C.; St. Louis, Minneapolis, Sioux Falls and Philadelphia.

"In Philly, I worked on cases involving labor racketeering and foreign counter-intelligence," he said. "In Minneapolis, I worked on

cases involving bank robberies, fugitives and extortion."

After a back injury, Cantin retired from the FBI. He and his wife returned to South Dakota, where he worked for Citibank security in Sioux Falls, working with fraud and other cases. He then served as Yankton police chief until 1995, followed by teaching one semester of criminal justice at Huron University.

Mount Marty College officials saw an opportunity to build their criminal justice program with Cantin's experience and contacts.

Sister Ann Kessler said she met Cantin when she co-chaired the Governor's Citizen Committee on Corrections. She also served on the South Dakota Commission on Criminal Justice.

At MMC, Sister Ann taught criminal justice courses. The college also used adjunct faculty but wanted a separate major and full-time faculty member.

"We contacted Leon about the position," Sister Ann said. "I have always been impressed with the man, and he is quite personable."

Jason Even, a 1997 MMC graduate, was one of Cantin's first criminal justice students.

"The majority of my classes were with Leon. He was pretty intriguing," Even said. "I always thought it would be cool to be an FBI agent, and Leon told all the stories that you wanted to hear about his experiences, the things he saw over the years. That kind of knowledge really fueled the fire and had me thinking that this was what I wanted to go into. I wanted to catch the bad guys."

Cantin used his contacts across the nation to help MMC students, Even said. "There was nothing that Leon wouldn't do for you," he said.

Cantin stressed ethics and integrity, and Even said he has used those lessons first as a Brookings police officer and now as a state Division of Criminal Investigation (DCI) agent in Brookings. Even was named the state's DCI Special Agent of the Year for 2010.

"You learn how to cop. They don't teach it," Even said. "Leon always said, 'You know when you know.' You know when a guy needs a break and when he needs to go to jail. We talked a lot about that."

Even said he wasn't surprised to learn Cantin was ordained a deacon and serving Even's childhood parish in Sioux Falls.

"It's a continuation of why Leon went into 'copping' — to help people and be there for people," Even said. "Those are the same things he is now doing through his ministry."

Cantin admitted he wasn't sure about the diaconate, but he felt drawn to the calling.

"Lightning didn't strike and the clouds didn't part. It happened like a gentle breeze," he said. "My wife and I would drive around the (Lewis and Clark) lake and talk about it."

As part of his formation as deacon, Cantin began working on his masters degree in pastoral ministry through MMC in 1997. He was ordained in 2000 for the permanent diaconate.

Transitional deacons are working toward the priesthood and must follow a way of celibacy. Permanent deacons can be married but cannot remarry if their spouse dies. If single, permanent deacons can't marry.

"For deacon, I receive the sacrament of Holy Orders," Cantin said. "I am one of the few Catholics that have received all seven sacraments."

When Cantin indicated he and his wife were moving from Yankton to Sioux Falls, the bishop had openings in three parishes for full-time deacons. Cantin was assigned to Christ the King Church in 2005 and has served there ever since.

"The diaconate is a real blessing," he said. "I see people at a significant time in their lives — as

they get married or baptized, or as they good-bye to loved ones. It's all part of the ministry."

The number of permanent diaconate is increasing, Cantin said, but he would like to see families encourage their children to enter a religious vocation.

"In first and second grades, the children want to be priests and sisters. By sixth grade, nobody wants to become one," he said. "We have parents whose first thoughts about their children entering the religious life is that 'I'll have no grandkids.' We need to focus on vocations."

Cantin looks forward to spending more time with his family, particularly his son who is returning from Iraq in November. But he remains grateful to MMC for helping him become a professor, oblate and deacon.

"I have really been blessed. I am fortunate that Sister Ann has been an important part of all that," he said. "I am grateful to Mount Marty to be part of something that began and became a special experience. It was a special presence on the campus that I called my home. It was easy to be part of it."

Cantin was fulfilling God's plan, Sister Ann said. "We know we're not perfect, and we know we have crosses. But perfection is doing the will of God," she said.

Life is really about having faith, Cantin said.

"I found myself asking, 'Is it really God's will that I do this? Why am I here? Why put me in this space?'" he said. "Leaving the FBI was very difficult. But God had a grand plan, not a specific plan. Without Him, I wouldn't have done all these other things in my life."
