ON THIS DATE

75 YEARS AGO

Saturday, July 13, 1935

- Samuel H. Eirod, 79, of Clark, former governor of South Dakota, died in a Watertown hospital at 3:06 a.m. The former governor was taken to Watertown for an emergency operation for strangulated hernia. Last Wednesday, he suffered a stroke, his second in seven weeks.
- Scores nursed hurts from rocks, rifle butts, staves and bayonets today after riotous street fighting precipitated by the prolonged Pacific northwest lumber strike.

50 YEARS AGO

Wednesday, July 13, 1960

- During a severe thunderstorm Tuesday at about 2:30 p.m., lightning struck and burned out the electric equipment at the Bartlett grain elevator in Springfield. The storm was accompanied by about .02 inch of rain in a half-hour period.
- Theft of two pickup trucks, one of which was later found afire along U.S. Highway 81 about six miles north of Yankton, is being investigated today by local authorities.

25 YEARS AGO

Saturday, July 13, 1985

- Boy Scout Troop 180 departed Friday evening from Yankton for the Canadian Boundary Waters. The canoeing and portaging expedition begins today after an all night drive to Ely, Minn. About 20 scouts are making the trip, and will return July 21.
- A number of people attended the dedication Friday of the new Yankton Area Adjustment Training Center housing complex at 2311 Cedar Terrace. The eight-bedroom facility will be home to 16 residents.

National Park Service Offering Free Junior Ranger Programs

The National Park Service is offering the following free Ranger Programs in the coming weeks:

- Every Saturday and Sunday morning at 11 a.m. at the Lewis & Clark Visitor Center (Gavins Point Dam Project), National Park Rangers will offer Junior Ranger Programs for children from now through Labor Day Weekend. The target ages for these programs are 6-11, but families and "kids of all ages" are welcome to participate. Come learn about your local national park and earn your Junior Ranger badge or certificate — and learn about our self-guided Junior Ranger activities and how to earn a Junior Ranger Patch. Program topics will vary.
- Friday, July 16 (1-3 p.m.) at the Lake Yankton "Bubble" just outside the Chief White Crane Campground, Rangers will be hosting a fishing clinic. Come learn about the fish that live in the Missouri National Recreational River and how to identify them, fishing regulations, bait and tackle. We provide bait and fishing poles, but you're also welcome to bring your own if you prefer.
- At 7 p.m. Friday, July 16, at Wiegand State Park, Rangers will present a program about Chief Standing Bear, a Ponca tribal member, and his plight to return to his homeland. Come learn about this man and his precedent-setting experience. This same program will also be offered at 7:30 p.m. at Lewis & Clark State Park.
- At 11 a.m. Saturday, July 17, there will be a Junior Ranger Program at Lewis & Clark Visitor Center (Gavins Point Dam Project).
- At 6 p.m. Saturday at Randall Creek State Park, the program "Missouri National Recreational River — Changing Currents" will be offered. Come learn why these stretches of the Missouri River have been designated as a Wild and Scenic River and are part of the National Park System, one of the 392 special places that tell the stories of who we are as Americans and our collective national heritage.
- At 7 p.m. Saturday at the Ponca State Park campground shelter, there will be a hands-on Junior Ranger "Par Fleche" Program, during which visitors will learn about and make their own par fleche or prairie pouch.
- At 11 a.m. Sunday, July 18, a Junior Ranger Program will be offered at Lewis & Clark Visitor Center (Gavins Point Dam Project).
- July 19-23 is the University of South Dakota's Missouri River Institute's K-12 Teacher Workshop: Science, Culture, and History of the Missouri River at Ponca State Park. The workshop is sponsored by the Institute, the National Park Service, Nebraska State Parks, Army Corps of Engineers, and other partners. Pre-registration is required. CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures fell Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for September delivery fell 2.25 cents to \$5.3575 a bushel, while September corn dropped 3.75 cents to \$3.7975 a bushel and oats for July delivery sank 11 cents to \$2.47 a bushel. November soybeans shed 2.25 cents to \$9.51 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef and pork futures also traded lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

August live cattle slipped 0.13 cent to 90.07 cents a pound; August feeder cattle edged down 0.53 cent to \$1.1267 a pound; August lean hogs fell 0.57 cent to 79.45 cents a pound; and July pork bellies lost 0.5 cent to \$1.017 a pound.
