be bicycling through the community and wanted to know if we wanted to house them for one evening," said Linda Nelson, head of the church's missions committee. "So we did it last year, now we're just one of their stops."

Pastor Ron Johnson said he hoped the church could continue its association with Bike and Build into the future.

"I think it is just a wonderful thing, that we can take care of each other," he said. "We affirm these people for that they are doing, and we're telling them that as we host this we walk alongside of them and we support them in their efforts, especially on a hot day like today."

"We think it's a great program (because) they do go around

and build houses and help people," Nelson added. "Last year they donated \$100 to our own local Habitat for Humanity for putting them up."

Several community businesses and organizations have also gotten involved, including Wal-Mart and Hy-Vee, which have both donated food to the cyclists, and the Summit Activities Center, which allowed them to use its shower facilities.

"It's a community effort, really," Nelson said.

On an average day, the cyclists will cover about 70 miles, although the number varies.

"In the mountainous areas, we only did 50-mile days," Matheson said. "Our longest ride so far — which we did (Friday) — was 107 miles."

"We've been pretty good group," said member Jake Bloom. "We've had a lot of fun. We haven't had too many problems on the road, other than getting lost a couple of times, which

resolves itself pretty quickly. Other than that, it's just been a blast."

"It's awesome," agreed Matheson. "It was hard in the beginning, but everyone's just been so wonderful, and the people you meet along the way make it a really neat time."

The only real problem the group has encountered as of yet is the heat.

"We try to avoid the heat as much as possible," Bloom said. "But on the longer days it's kind of hard to do, so we pack a lot of water, have two lunches a day, carry two (containers) of Gatorade at all times and try to take as many breaks as possible."

Matheson said that the group typically wakes up around 5-6 a.m. so they can get started before it gets too hot.

"(On Saturday), we woke up at four because it was so hot and we wanted to beat the heat," she said. "We were very thankful that we did."

Bike and Build was established in 2000, and has since contributed more than \$2.3 million to housing groups across the nation, and grown to include eight separate cross-country routes.

This is the first trip for both Bloom and Matheson.

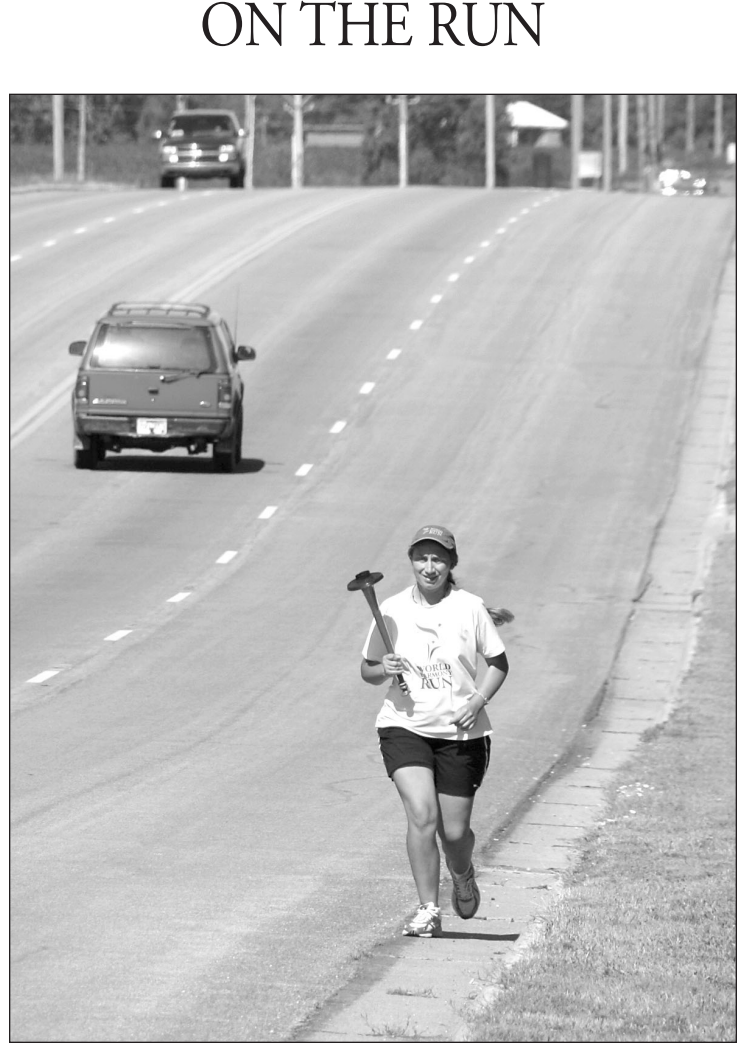
Bloom, a native of Charlottesville, Va., became involved in the program through a friend from school.

"I didn't even own a bike for the past two years," he said. "So I got my bike back in February after raising \$4,000 and did my training this spring. This is the most biking I've ever done in my life."

Matheson said her favorite part has been going to the building sites.

"It's almost like seeing the end product of what you've been riding for," she said.

Special Olympics Kicks Off National Games In Neb.

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — A religious opening ceremony marked Sunday's official start of the Special Olympics national games in the Nebraska capital.

The ceremony opened with the parade of athletes, as contingents from 47 states marched through the Devaney Sports Center in Lincoln under a haze of fake smoke. The athletes were accompanied by Special Olympics and Nebraska dignitaries, including Cornhuskers basketball coach Doc Sadler.

The Nebraska contingent — the largest of all the states, with 286 athletes — was accompanied by Curt Tomasevich, a Shelby native who won a gold medal in the four-man bobsled team at the 2010 Winter Olympics. U.S. Sen. Ben Nelson and Congressman Jeff Fortenberry and Gov. Dave Heineman also were among the escorts.

"Each of you have demonstrated a fierce determination, and I know you will represent your teams and your respective states with pride," Heineman said in a speech to all the athletes.

But he had a special message for Nebraska's competitors: "Go Big Red." The mantra was later echoed in a talk by tennis player and Omaha native Andy Roddick. Roddick's wife, model and actress Brooklyn Decker, hosted the event along with Special Olympics athlete and actor Eddie Barbanell.

Barbanell, who appeared in the 2005 comedy "The Ringer," advised the nearly 3,000 athletes to "have fun and make as many new friends as you can. Compete and go for the gold."

Musical guests included Sandi Patty, Christian rock band Jars of Clay and "American Idol" contestant Michael Sarver.

Athletes will begin competition Monday in 13 sporting events, including the newly added flag football. The Special Olympics concludes Friday. The closing ceremony is scheduled to begin at 7 p.m.

- The U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals today struck down Delaware's grade-year school desegregation plan and ordered full integration of the state's public schools to begin in the fall of 1961.

25 YEARS AGO

Friday, July 19, 1985

- Scientists at the Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory at South Dakota State University have confirmed cases of anthrax in cattle in southwestern South Dakota — the first such reported cases in three years.
- South Dakota's six state-run colleges and universities need \$13.2 million more than they're now spending — or about 8 percent, according to budget submitted to the Board of Regents.
