"It's a pretty risky business. It only takes a second for everything to go to hell," Curtis said. "My main goal is everyone goes home at night with all their fingers and toes. The rest of it is secondary."

What could go wrong? Curtis said he doesn't like to talk about it. But he admits that a drill bit could break, or some other mechanical failure could occur.

"It's long hours of boredom broken up by moments of sheer terror," concurred co-worker Charles Woodard.

From the city's perspective, the entire well project is going well, Goodmanson said.

"The two wells that were drilled will produce an estimated 5 million gallons per day," he said. "That was a little bit more than we were expecting. We had been looking at 4 million gallons in the last few estimates."

"There is a little more iron in the water than we expected, but the iron and manganese can be removed with treatment," Goodmanson added. "We don't see any problems with that."

The well project is expected to result in water coming from the Nebraska shore by the end of October.

Initially, the city will blend well water and water taken from the river surface. Goodmanson said customers should not notice a difference in the taste of the water.

The project addresses challenges faced by Yankton's drinking water system. Among them are the degradation of the Missouri River, which necessitates the extension of the surface water intakes. Also of concern has been higher drinking water standards. The unpredictability of the quality of the surface water on the river makes it difficult to treat. Specifically, it has contributed to levels of trihalomethanes (THMs) in the city's drinking water occasionally exceeding federal guidelines.

Former Neb. Chief Justice Hastings Dies

LINCOLN, Neb. — William Hastings, who served Nebraska as chief justice for eight years, has died.

Hastings had spent 30 years as a judge, first for Lancaster County District Court, then on the Supreme Court, then finally as chief justice. He retired in 1995 and was succeeded by C. Thomas White.

A spokesman for Roper & Sons Funeral Services says Hastings died Saturday at the age of 89.

University of Nebraska-Lincoln law professor Susan Jacobs told the Lincoln Journal Star that Hastings "was fair, thoughtful, always considerate of litigants and counsel."

Hastings was named to the Supreme Court by then-Gov. Charlie Thone, who said Monday that Hastings "epitomized what you were looking for."

"Most of all he was a straight arrow as far as the law was concerned," Thone said.

Hastings said one of the highlights of his tenure as chief justice was the creation of the state Court of Appeals.

When he retired in 1995, he said "enough is enough."

"It will be nice to be able to do those things I've been wanting to do without feeling that I have to read briefs or write opinions," Hastings said, adding that he looked forward to fishing or even doing nothing at all.

Hastings is survived by his wife, Julie Ann, their daughter and two sons.

A memorial service is scheduled to begin at 10 a.m. Saturday at First Presbyterian Church in Lincoln.

Hutchinson County's withdrawal would likely make an immediate financial impact on the JRWDD, Templeton said.

"The way I understand it, if this was passed in tax year 2010, it would affect the tax levies for 2010 that would be collected in 2011," he said. "It's possible those 2010 levies may not be collected in 2011. That's a question for the (state) Department of Revenue and Regulations to make that call."

During last week's meeting in Yankton, the JRWDD board authorized general manager Darrell Raschke to consult an attorney on SB 184's constitutionality.

The board members said they are prepared to challenge the law. They particularly questioned a county commission's authority to put the withdrawal of a county from a water district on the ballot. Raschke said the matter could end up in court.

Despite the prospect of a lawsuit, both Warn and Templeton said they are moving forward with the election process to meet upcoming deadlines.

"That is within their (JRWDD's) purview to challenge the law," Templeton said. "But beyond that, we have to follow the state law until it's proven otherwise. And this is the law right now."

At Tuesday's regular meeting, the Hutchinson County Commission didn't discuss the possible JRWDD lawsuit or its impact on the county election, said Commissioner Gillas Stern of Freeman.

"But I had a copy of the article (about the JRWDD meeting) in the Yankton paper and read it to the other commissioners (who live outside the Press & Dakotan coverage area)," he said.

Stern had no personal comments on the JRWDD meeting or the water district's possible suit against SB 184.

"If (the water district) wants it to be challenged, they have every right to do it," he said.

The question of putting JRWDD membership to a public vote originated with two Hutchinson County residents, Stern said. Elmer Bietz of Tripp and Ray Mettler of Menno had requested that the county withdraw from the water district.

"They were going to circulate a petition and, if they got enough signatures on the petition, bring it to a vote in the November election and let the people decide," Stern said.

"We could have made them circulate the petitions and gather enough signatures. It would have taken about 200 signatures to get it on the ballot, based on numbers from the last presidential election."

However, the commissioners decided to put the measure directly on the ballot, Stern said. The election will give voters a voice on the matter at little or no additional expense to the county, he said.

The Hutchinson County commissioners passed their resolution by a 4-1 vote. Charlie Sandhoff of Dimock, Brad Henke of Parkston, Dallas Laffey of Tripp and Stern voted in favor of the measure. Betty Bauer of rural Freeman — whose father-in-law serves on the JRWDD board — cast the lone "no" vote.

In the end, the resolution lies in the best interests of county residents, Stern said.

"The County Commission wanted to give the people every opportunity to decide whether to continue to be part of the water district," he said. "Everyone can make a decision based on the facts, as given by both parties."

CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures were mixed Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for September delivery dropped 5.25 cents to \$5.77 a bushel, while September corn fell 7.5 cents to \$3.74 a bushel and oats for September delivery lost 4.5 cents to \$2.56 a bushel. November soybeans added 1 cent to \$9.73 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef and pork futures also traded mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

August live cattle were flat at 93.12 cents a pound; August feeder cattle inched up 0.05 cent to \$1.1447 a pound; August lean hogs slid 1.6 cents to 80.02 cents a pound; and August pork bellies gained 1 cent to 98.7 cents a pound.
