### Corps Of Engineers Increasing Dam Releases

The Corps of Engineers has begun increasing releases from Gavins Point Dam to help evacuate more than 9 million acre feet of flood water stored in the Missouri River main stem reservoir system. The spillway will be utilized for these additional releases. Additional releases are expected to continue through at least the end of November.

The Corps reminds everyone to use extra caution when boating in the area downstream of the dam and spillway. River currents will be extremely swift due to the extra releases causing hazardous river conditions.

Boaters are encouraged to follow these safety precautions:

- Do not cross the buoy line in front of the spillway
- Never tie your boat to the buoy line. Rapid river flows can cause the boat to fill with water and be pulled under
- Life jackets are strongly encouraged for all people in your boat. Even good swimmers can be pulled under by fast river currents

### Service Officers, Parole And Agents Honored

PIERRE — The work of court service officers, parole agents and juvenile corrections agents is being recognized this week.

Gov. Mike Rounds and South Dakota Supreme Court Chief Justice David Gilbertson have proclaimed July 18-24, 2010, as Court Services, Parole Agents and Juvenile Corrections Agents Week in South Dakota.

In South Dakota, parole and juvenile community corrections are functions of the Department of Corrections, while probation falls under the supervision of the Unified Judicial System.

As of June 30, 2010, there were more than 2,300 people on parole and suspended sentence supervision in South Dakota and juvenile corrections agents were supervising more than 800 youth in placement and on aftercare in South Dakota. Nationwide, there are more than five million adults and juveniles that are under various types of community supervision.

Parole field offices are located in Aberdeen, Brookings, Huron, Mitchell, Pierre, Rapid City, Sioux Falls, Spearfish, Watertown and Yankton. Juvenile Corrections Agents field offices are located in Aberdeen, Brookings, Chamberlain, Custer, Huron, Mitchell, Mobridge, Pierre, Rapid City, Sioux Falls, Sisseton, Spearfish, Watertown, White River, Winner and Yankton.

# Group Using Pies To Attract Tourists

The Outlaw Trails Scenic Byway tourism group in Nebraska is celebrating the summer along Highway 12 from Valentine to Sioux City with a special attraction.

"See the Byway the Pie way" is a result of brainstorming between group members that will bring tourists to the northern edges of Nebraska to discover hidden treasures.

"The point is to pull tourists into our area," said Byway president Mary Rose Pinkelman of St. James.

Other officers include Sally Snow, vice-president; Kris Kreycik, treasurer; and Marita Placek, secretary.

To that end, the Byways group has coordinated between all the Byway members to offer a special pie at their particular stop. In St. James at the Marketplace it is the special Lemon Meringue pie. Other stops along the Byway may have peach or apple specialties. In Ponca, a visitor can stop for Outlaw Pizza Pie but when you stop at the Kreycik Riverview Elk & Buffalo Ranch, their specialty, Buffalo Pie, won't be for tasting.

It's this kind of humor which keeps the volunteers of the Scenic Byway seeking new opportunities to invite travelers to venture off the beaten path and try rural Nebraska.

It's also not the only heavy-duty project the Byway group undertook while planning this summer's fun along the trail.

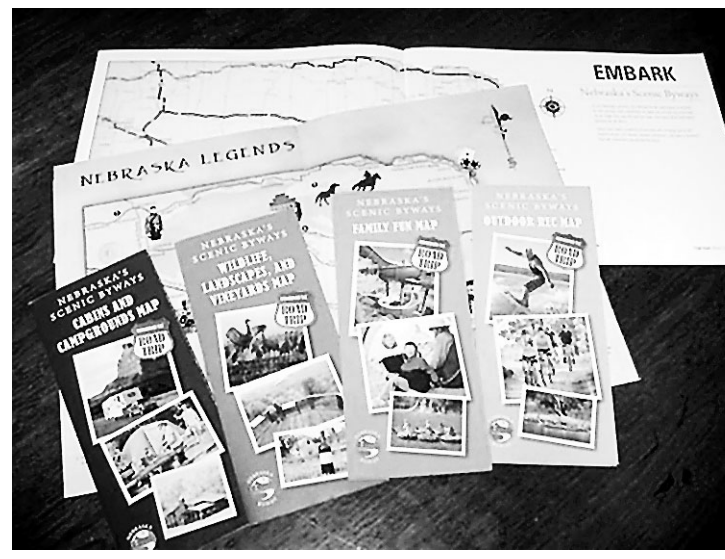

Pinkelman along with the help of Jan Jorgensen of the Northeast Nebraska RC&D, applied for a grant to develop new brochures for the Outlaw Trail and also website enhancement.

"Grant dollars are doing a lot of good in rural Nebraska," said Jorgensen. "We are starting to tell it is making a difference."

At a recent meeting, the Outlaw group members unpacked boxes of brand new brochures, developed and printed as a result of the recent grant, and it was like Christmas in July. Four different large colored flyers depict maps for family fun; outdoor recreation; wildlife, landscapes and vineyards; and

cabins and campgrounds from east to west along Highway 12.

The group made plans to distribute the brochures to all the tourist stops but it is never easy. The success of these hometown activities is all due to volunteer efforts. Sometimes only six members show up for a meeting and maybe only those four Byway members show up at a motorcycle rally promoting Hwy 12 as an alternate route to the fall Sturgis rally. But the enthusiasm from those small individuals can be very infectious. It is what has kept the Scenic Byway Trails group working together for over ten years.

The brochures were a winter

project which Pinkelman and trails member Angie Peltz worked on. Each brochure covers area events and attractions over the summer months like Carhenge, melon patch dates, goat milk and ice cream shops and vineyards with wine tasting from the sandhills around Valentine to the lush recreational treats along the Missouri National Scenic River.

Nebraska Scenic Byways' summer promotion is "Rediscover the Road Trip" and the Highway 12 Byway is enthused about attracting visitors.

The Byways' most successful promotion is scheduled for the weekend of Oct. 1-3. "Quilting the Byway" brings out all the warm, fuzzy feelings everyone has when wrapped in grandma's quilt. In each of the 20 cities and villages along the Scenic Byway, quilts are displayed and doors opened welcoming quilt lovers from around the Midwest. Quilting shops in Iowa, South Dakota and Nebraska display details and with very little expense and a lot of word of mouth communication, northeast Nebraska comes alive for a weekend.

Along the way CDs, which describe the area and tourist opportunities or places of interest, are available to listen to as tourists drive the byway. They promote the message that there is something for everyone — from antique lovers to museums to historical landmarks, water recreation, hiking and biking and GPS caches — at several stops.

## Racial Tensions Rise In N.C. School Board

RALEIGH, N.C. — Protesters and police scuffled Tuesday at a school board meeting in North Carolina over claims that a new busing system would segregate schools, roiling racial tensions reminiscent of the 1960s.

Nineteen people were arrested, including the head of state NAACP chapter who was banned from the meeting after a trespassing arrest at a June school board gathering.

"We know that our cause is right," the Rev. William Barber said shortly before police put plastic handcuffs on his wrists before the meeting started.

Inside, more than a dozen demonstrators disrupted the meeting by gathering around a podium, chanting and singing against the board's policies.

After several minutes, Raleigh police intervened and asked them to leave. When they refused, the officers grabbed arms and tried to arrest the protesters. One child was caught in the pushing and shoving, as was school board

member Keith Sutton, who was nearly arrested before authorities realized who he was.

"Hey, hey, ho, ho, resegregation has got to go," some protesters chanted.

Sutton, the only black member of the board, said he went into the crowd to try and calm things down and encourage officers not to use such strong force. He said he felt insulted that he almost got arrested and believes the officer who tried to detain him owes him an apology.

"I'm just real dismayed and disappointed," Sutton said.

The Wake County School Board has voted multiple times over the last several months to scrap the district's diversity policy, which distributed students based on socioeconomic and for years had been a model for other districts looking to balance diversity in schools. Several school board members elected last year have built a majority in favor of focusing on neighborhood schools.

The board's chairman, Ron Margiotta, said the panel would not be distracted in its effort to "provide choice and increased stability for families."

## Only Two Responsible For Utah Immigrant List

SALT LAKE CITY — Utah Gov. Gary Herbert said Tuesday that only two state workers were responsible for compiling and publicly distributing a list of personal information of 1,300 purported illegal immigrants, and one of them has confessed to his or her involvement.

State officials had been investigating as many as 10 employees for possible involvement, but nobody else will face disciplinary action.

"Others may have been aware, but not complicit," Herbert said.

Herbert also said that one of the implicated workers, whose names have not been released, was a temporary employee and already has been fired while the other is expected to be terminated by Wednesday.

Herbert's remarks came after a summit Tuesday on illegal immigration in which he said the public release of the list last week was damaging to immigration reform efforts. At the meeting, lawmakers, law enforcement and community leaders discussed duplicating an Arizona-style crackdown on immigration and which Herbert said may have some appeal.

The list of purported illegal immigrants, which was mailed to law enforcement officials and the news media, contains Social Security numbers, birth dates, workplaces, addresses and phone numbers; names of children are included, along with due dates of pregnant women. An attached letter demands that those on it be deported, although some on it have said they are in the country legally.

The list sent chills through Hispanic community, with many fearing they could be unfairly targeted. U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement officials have acknowledged receiving the list but declined to say whether anyone on it is being investigated. The two employees implicated in the list's compilation both work for the Department of Workforce Services, which administers food stamps and Medicaid programs. Herbert said the employees gathered the information in a methodical manner to get around department security protocols.

Intentionally releasing a private record in Utah is a misdemeanor punishable by up to six months in jail and a \$1,000 fine. Herbert has said federal laws may also have been violated. Information gathered in the internal probe will be turned over to the attorney general's office on Wednesday for possible prosecution; that office will also conduct its own investigation.

The summit Tuesday had been planned before the release of the list, primarily in response to calls from conservative state lawmakers looking to pass an immigration law similar to Arizona's.

Arizona's law, which takes effect July 29, directs police enforcing other laws to determine a suspect's immigration status if there is reason to believe the person is in the U.S. illegally. The Obama administration has sued Arizona to throw out the law and keep other states from copying it.

Utah Rep. Stephen Sandstrom, R-Orem, told attendees that he still intends to sponsor a similar bill when lawmakers convene in January.

Herbert has said he will sign an immigration bill into law if he's still governor in January following a special election, but it's unclear what that might look like. On Tuesday, he said a specific immigration proposal would not come out of his office, but he would work with lawmakers on their proposals.
