



Poverty Simulation Planned For July 28

VERMILLION — The University of South Dakota School of Law along with the W.O. Farber Center and the South Dakota Youth Congress (SDYC) under the Chiesman Center of Democracy, Inc., will host "The Challenges" and Effects of Poverty," a poverty simulation for students and adults, on Wednesday, July 28, from 1:30 to 3:45 p.m.

Monday

Student leaders will have an opportunity to discuss poverty and how it impacts their lives, community and state. Through a roundtable discussion format, students will express their thoughts focusing on deliberation and learning how to come to a consensus about each issue discussed. Students will make recommendations to state and national leaders regarding their

ideas on important public policy issues related to poverty in South Dakota

The poverty simulation learning tool was created as a way to help participants understand the realities of poverty during a roleplay activity that involves emulating the lives of low-income families. Some are Temporary Assistance for Needy Family (TANF) recipients, some are disabled and some are senior citizens relying on Social Security. Participants have the stressful task of providing for basic necessities and shelter on a limited budget during the course of four 15-minute "weeks." They interact with human service agencies, grocers, pawnbrokers, bill collectors, job interviewer, police officers and others.

Association for Community Action, the simulation is designed to sensitize those who frequently deal with low-income families as well as provide broader awareness of poverty among policymakers, community leaders and others as one out of every seven individuals in South Dakota lives at or below the poverty line; and Social Security is the only source of income for one in four South Dakotans age 65 or older (according to AARP).


