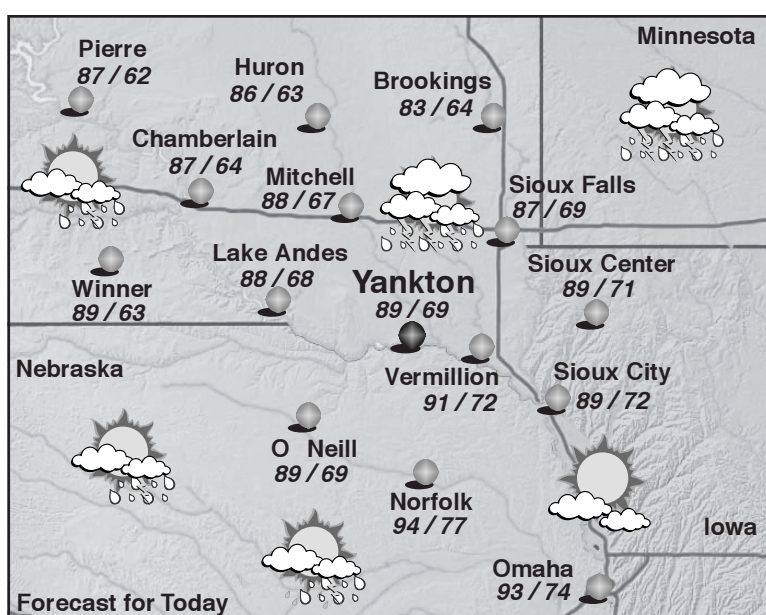

Poverty Simulation Planned For July 28

VERMILLION — The University of South Dakota School of Law along with the W.O. Farber Center and the South Dakota Youth Congress (SDYC) under the Chiesman Center of Democracy, Inc., will host "The Challenges and Effects of Poverty," a poverty simulation for students and adults, on Wednesday, July 28, from 1:30 to 3:45 p.m.

Student leaders will have an opportunity to discuss poverty and how it impacts their lives, community and state. Through a roundtable discussion format, students will express their thoughts focusing on deliberation and learning how to come to a consensus about each issue discussed. Students will make recommendations to state and national leaders regarding their

ideas on important public policy issues related to poverty in South Dakota.

The poverty simulation learning tool was created as a way to help participants understand the realities of poverty during a role-play activity that involves emulating the lives of low-income families. Some are Temporary Assistance for Needy Family (TANF) recipients, some are disabled and some are senior citizens relying on Social Security. Participants have the stressful task of providing for basic necessities and shelter on a limited budget during the course of four 15-minute "weeks." They interact with human service agencies, grocers, pawnbrokers, bill collectors, job interviewer, police officers and others.

Created by the Missouri Association for Community Action, the simulation is designed to sensitize those who frequently deal with low-income families as well as provide broader awareness of poverty among policy-makers, community leaders and others as one out of every seven individuals in South Dakota lives at or below the poverty line; and Social Security is the only source of income for one in four South Dakotans age 65 or older (according to AARP).

Visitation Center. "Right now, visitations and exchanges take place around one another. This will be completely separate and much more private."

The Family Visitation Center is a supervised environment for family visitations and child exchanges.

Three rooms can be used for visitations, and each is equipped with audio and video recording devices so the visits can be kept on file for potential court proceedings.

Healy said that, in the last year, visitation hours have tripled and the number of clients is up about 25 percent.

Desiree Slaba, executive director of the Women's and Children's Center, said the number of women seeking shelter from domestic violence situations has also been on the increase.

"In 2009, our shelter nights doubled what we saw in 2008," she said. "I can't determine what that increase is due to, whether it's the economy or public awareness of our facility or something else."

While the old shelter houses anywhere from 9-13 people, the new building will be able to hold 20-25 individuals.

"This facility offers a lot of advantages over the current facility," Slaba explained. "It's a lot bigger and the layout is more convenient. It also has an enhanced security system in comparison to our other shelter. We put a lot of thought into it, because obviously safety is the most important factor of what we do at the shelter."

"I'm most excited about what this building has to offer the community and our clients," she continued. "It's going to be tremendous for women to be able to come into the shelter and have some privacy. At the old shelter, there is really no privacy at all."

The portion of the facility

dedicated to sheltering women and children has a handful of rooms with individual bathrooms that can be secured to give a sense of safety. It also has a laundry room and a commons area with a kitchen and living room. A fenced-in backyard will allow children to play outdoors.

Slaba said the moving process into the new facility should be complete by Sunday and a transition plan is in place for women staying at the current shelter. Once the move is complete, the former shelter's ownership will revert back to the Contact Center.

In addition to the grant for the Yankton Women's and Children's Center, more than \$60,000 was raised to furnish the building. Some businesses even donated appliances.

"I just want to thank the community for the tremendous support they've provided over the past year during this process," Slaba said.
