CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures were mixed Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for September delivery climbed 5.5 cents to \$5.95 a bushel, while September corn slid 1.25 cents to \$3.6275 a bushel and oats for September delivery fell 4.5 cents to \$2.465 a bushel. November soybeans lost 0.5 cent to \$9.655 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef and pork futures also traded mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

October live cattle edged up 0.15 cent to \$3.92 cents a pound; August feeder cattle slipped 0.05 cent to \$1.149 a pound; October lean hogs rose 0.75 cent to 76.22 cents a pound; and August pork bellies dropped 3 cents to 99.75 cents a pound.

tribal chairmen and various tribes ahead of time.

The tribal-focus meetings will recognize special American Indian concerns, such as cultural resources, she said.

"We are making sure (Corps officials) are consulting with the tribes on the issues that impact them up and down the Missouri River basin," she said.

Public feedback will play an important role in the MRAPS process, said Mark Harberg, study co-manager.

"We have received numerous comments and excellent input from the public," he said. "We encourage the public to continue to provide us with their suggestions, ideas and concerns, which we will take into consideration as the study is shaped."

The comments so far have covered the entire spectrum of opinion, Harberg said. The input ranges from evaluating Congress' authorized uses of the river to more specific issues related to flood control, water supply and better management of fish and wildlife, he said.

The public feels the time is right for the MRAPS process and reviewing the Missouri River's future, Farmer said.

"There is a lot of support for the study overall," she said. "People feel there is a need to go back and take a look at the original 1944 Pick-Sloan Act to determine if it's in alignment with contemporary needs along the river."

going to do so at the taxpayer's risk," Dellinger said. "A developer-backed tax-increment finance district would alleviate that issue. I would anticipate that the city is expecting in the next few months Dial will have a financial statement and a project plan that will come before them."

If the retail projects being worked on behind the scenes come through, Dellinger stated that it will pay dividends throughout the community.

"We would like for someone to be able to stay in Yankton for goods and services that are currently often obtained elsewhere, and then have consumers go to a Yankton restaurant and a Yankton movie theatre at the end of the shopping experience as opposed to one in a metropolitan area an hour away," he said.

On the jobs front, Dellinger said positive developments are already materializing. For example, Kolberg-Pioneer, Inc., recently added about three dozen workers, he stated.

Dellinger added that he is currently working with a local company on an expansion project that could lead to the addition of between 85 and 90 manufacturing jobs. That news could come as soon as next month.
