gerous risk-taking that caused the meltdown," she said. "It makes common sense reforms that will ensure that Wall Street is forced to start playing by the rules. It will end bailouts by ensuring that taxpayers aren't the ones on the hook when someone on Wall Street makes a bad choice, or takes too large a risk."

Republican U.S. House Candidate Kristi Noem, who will face Herseth in the November election, said she's heard concerns from South Dakotans about the law while on the campaign trail.

"I think South Dakotans are looking at this legislation realistically, and they certainly understand that it's going to make credit and capital more difficult for their small businesses to gain," Noem said.

"They've been asking for jobs, not bailouts. They've gotten more regulations, but the same regulators who were in charge before didn't even address the two biggest culprits that started the financial crisis: Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac," she added.

Noem also dislikes the law because it adds to the nation's deficit, she said. She would not

have voted for it, or the bailout in 2008.

Herseth Sandlin, who voted for the Wall Street reform bill, but against the Wall Street bailout, said the reform law will only help South Dakota families. While campaigning, she has listened to the concerns of South Dakotans and determined the best policy for the state before voting, Sandlin said.

"One specific way South Dakotans will benefit from the bill are the provisions on the use of derivatives," she said. "Derivatives markets serve important price discovery and risk management roles for agricultural producers and businesses across South Dakota. However, in recent years the activities of Wall Street speculators have been distorting these markets and making it harder for long-time participants who rely on these markets to hedge business risks."

"This legislation will help legitimate users of derivatives, including those in South Dakota, because, for the first time, the Over the Counter derivatives marketplace will be transparent and speculators will be held accountable," Herseth Sandlin added.

In an e-mail to the *Press & Dakotan*, Independent U.S. House candidate B. Thomas Marking said he has not noticed South Dakota voters "particularly tuned into this issue."

He continued, "It's hard to

make a connection between reform of the financial system and the persistent reality of unemployment and underemployment that weighs on every mind."

Marking also said he was not going to claim to have read the Wall Street reform legislation, but instead, like most people, relies on second-hand analysis.

But, after reading "It Takes a Pillage" by Nomi Prins, Marking realized more about the current economic situation.

"I've come to the conclusion that our economic crisis was caused by corporate arrogance, empowered by congressional ignorance, and perpetuated by political cowardice," he wrote.

He also said that the latest legislation instills no confidence whatsoever that Wall Street is now under control, noting that he's positive "platoons of lawyers have already discovered many of the loopholes inevitable in such a massive bill."

Marking thinks some of the provisions in the Wall Street legislation are on the right track and others are "blatantly missing." He is also cautious because it will take years to see how it all plays out, he said.

U.S. Sen. Tim Johnson (D-S.D.), who is on the Senate Banking Committee, attended the ceremony where President Obama signed the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act into law.

In a statement to the media, Johnson said, "This is important legislation to restore accountability and transparency to Wall Street, give the financial services regulators new and better tools to anticipate problems in the financial sector and take care of them if any are identified, and to ensure that consumers, investors, and retirees have the right information to make good decisions about the financial products they use."

The Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act was introduced in June by a congressional conference committee, then passed in the House of Representatives in early July. Senate approval came July 15.

The legislation has been praised as being an important step toward securing fair financing for consumers, yet it has been criticized for being complicated and incomplete.

"I was honored to take part in the historic moment this morning, and I look forward to continuing my conversations with South Dakotans as we work to implement this legislation," Johnson said. "It will not be an easy task, and it is certainly possible that there will be aspects of this bill that need to be changed, but it is a necessary step to bring common sense back into focus."

CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures advanced Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for September delivery jumped 12 cents to \$6.275 a bushel, while September corn added 3 cents to \$3.7925 a bushel and oats for September delivery rose 4.5 cents to \$2.615 a bushel. November soybeans climbed 10 cents to \$9.88 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef futures fell and pork futures traded higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

October live cattle lost 0.73 cent to 93.47 cents a pound; August feeder cattle fell 0.8 cent to \$1.1372 a pound; October lean hogs gained 1.12 cents to 78.07 cents a pound; and August pork bellies edged up 0.75 cent to \$1.035 a pound.
