## Benedictine Sisters Celebrate Diamond Jubilees

Eight Yankton Benedictines celebrated Diamond Jubilees of 60, 70 and 75 years in a private community ceremony on Friday, July 30.

## 60 YEARS:

## SISTER ANN FASBENDER, OSB

Fasbender is a native of White, S.D. She felt the call to religious life when she was at Mount Marty High School and credits her sister teachers as influential in answering that call. She entered Sacred Heart Monastery in 1948 and made first profession in 1950.

Her ministry has included elementary teaching in Nebraska and South Dakota, directing the Mount Marty College Day Care, and ministry to the Native American people of North and South Dakota. She is currently part of the powerhouse of prayer.

She says of her jubilee, "It is a space of time in which I can pray with our Lord about how He wants me to spend my remaining years in His love and care."

## S. DORIS OBEREMBT, OSB

Oberembt grew up near Dimock, S.D. She says that at a young age she had a desire to serve God and Benedictine Sister. Her teachers, parents, an older sister, S. Mary Ann, and the prayer life of the family were significant factors in her vocation to religious life.

She has ministered as an elementary teacher in Nebraska, North and South Dakota, as a college teacher at Mount Marty College, pastoral minister in Iowa, Sioux Falls and at St. Benedict Parish in Yankton, sub-prioress of the monastery, and currently serves as a director of initial formation and as a spiritual director.

Of the past 60 years, she says, "I am grateful for the blessing of so many faithful people who have been revealed to me of God's love and a call to growth and service. This jubilee is a time of remembering, celebrating in gratitude and anticipation of the continued greatness of God's gifts gleaned in the every day events of life."

## SISTER MARCINE QUINTUS, OSB

Quintus is a native of Haymarsh, ND. She entered Sacred Heart Monastery in Yankton in 1948 and made first profession in 1950. She says that her vocation was influenced by many people including her parents, grandparents, teachers, and her older sister, S. Anthony. Quintus' ministry has

included 50 years in nursing, nursing education, and nursing administration including Avera Sacred Heart Hospital and Mount Marty College. She is now serving as the monastery baker and candle maker.

As she reflects on her jubilee, S. Marcine says, "Jubilee for me is a time of celebrating blessings; the lives of our ancestors; the opportunities and challenges of today's world, and a future charged with God's love. As I continue my life journey, I am more aware of God's presence among us in prayer, each other, nature and the events of life – a miracle in each new day."

## 70 YEARS:

## SISTER JEANETTE KLIMISCH, OSB

Klimisch is a native of the Siegel community near Yankton. She and her twin sister, Sister Jane Klimisch, who died on May 24, 2010, were inspired by the example of their teachers at Mount Marty Academy. They entered Sacred Heart Monastery in 1938 and made first profession in 1940.

S. Jeanette's ministry included over 40 years of teaching and administration at Mount Marty College, serving as Assistant Prioress and monastery oral historian as well as a board member of several health-care institutions and the South Dakota Health and Education Facilities Authority Board. She currently serves in a variety of ministries in the monastery.

She says, "The support of the community of Sisters remains a great strength in my life today as we join in daily prayer and work. As for the future, I trust that (as St. Paul says) 'All things work together for good for those who love God.'"

## SISTER LAETICIA KILZER, OSB

Kilzer grew up near Bentley, N.D. She cites the deep faith of her parents and the influence of the Yankton Benedictines teaching at St. Mary's High School in Richardson as significant factors in her call to the Benedictine way of life.

She entered Sacred Heart Monastery in August, 1938 and made first profession in 1940. Her ministry has included more than 50 years of teaching on all levels with thirty-three of those being as chemistry professor at Mount Marty College. She currently serves in a variety of ministries within the monastery.

Of her 70 years of monastic life, Kilzer says, "This jubilee is an opportunity to reflect on my life and the many blessings received over the years." Of Benedictine life she says, "I appreciate our prayer life, and

the freedom we have for interaction and forming relationships with each other as we build community."

## 75 YEARS:

## SISTER LEONETTE HOESING OSB

Hoesing is a native of Menominee, Neb. She entered Sacred Heart Monastery in September 1933 and made her first profession in 1935.

Her ministry has included elementary teaching, serving as Novice Mistress, in religious education and as Prioress for a community of sisters in British Columbia who were in need of outside assistance. She currently serves in a variety of ministries within the monastery. Reflecting on her 75th jubilee as a Benedictine, Hoesing says, "I am filled with joy and gratitude to God and my community for my journey in seeking God and serving God's people, Church and my community."

## SISTER HENRIETTA JUNDT, OSB

Jundt grew up near Linton, N.D. She credits the Sisters at Fort Yates mission and her parents as major influences in her call to the Benedictine way of life.

She entered Sacred Heart Monastery on June 2, 1932, and made first profession on July 11, 1935. S. Henrietta served in a variety of ministries at hospitals in Colorado, Nebraska and South Dakota, the Bishop's House in Sioux Falls, the mission at Stephan, S.D., Mount Marty College, the monastery kitchen, and the Monastery Gift Shop. She is now part of the powerhouse of prayer.

Of her 75 years as a Yankton Benedictine, Jundt says, "Life has been good to me — rather, God has been good to me. I am grateful, and I still enjoy life — even after 90!"

## SISTER VERA HEINTZ, OSB

Heintz is a native of Bowdle, S.D. Her one year of parochial school in Aberdeen and the faith of her parents were influential in her call to religious life.

She entered Sacred Heart Monastery in 1933 and made first profession in 1935 and final profession in 1941. She then spent over fifty years as an elementary teacher in Nebraska, South and North Dakota. She is now part of the powerhouse of prayer.

Of her jubilee, Heintz says, "I am thankful for my call as a Benedictine Sister, and I look forward to more growth in faith and love in the Lord's service."

- 646 registered
- 62 programs held
- 1,786 children attended our programs
- 588 adults attended our programs
- 28,915 items checked out
- 5,061 computer uses recorded
- 29,879 people walked through our doors

It has been great to see parents and children at several programs in the same week. We have had a great summer and hope to see everyone back throughout the year when fall programs begin.

During August, we will take a short break from activities and complete several projects we started over the summer. We'll then be ready to hit the ground running after Labor Day when story times and our visits to day cares begin again. Registration for fall story time begins on Aug. 16.

We are hoping to start a Baby and Me lap sit program this fall and add more activities to the preschool story time. 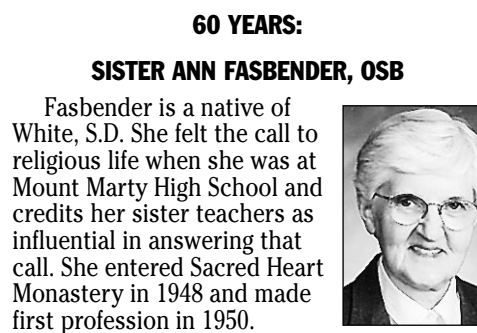

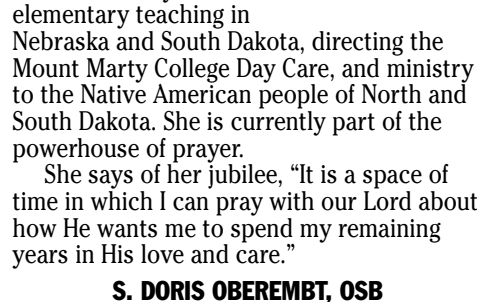
The library will be closed on Saturday, Aug. 21, so that staff can attend and participate in Riverboat Days. Look for our float in the parade.

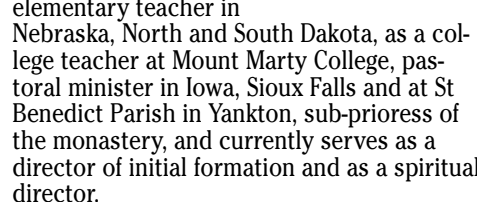
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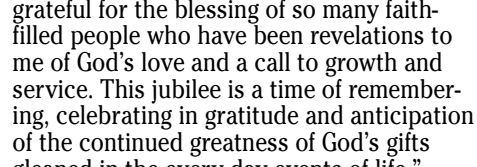
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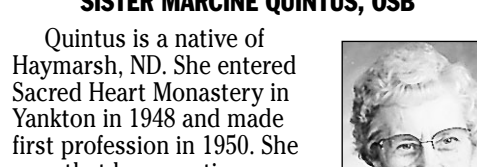
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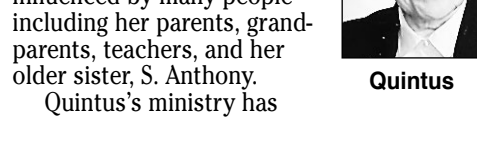
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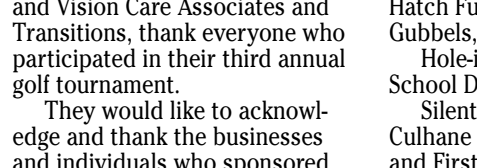
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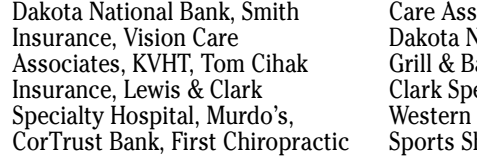
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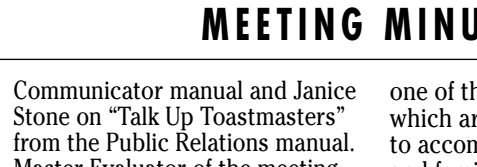
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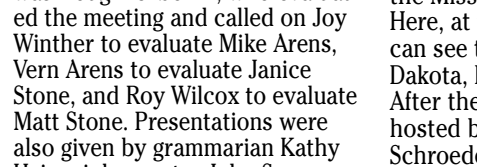
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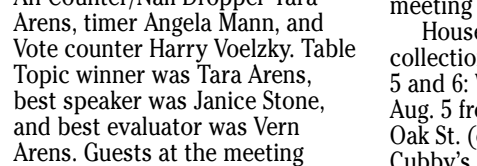
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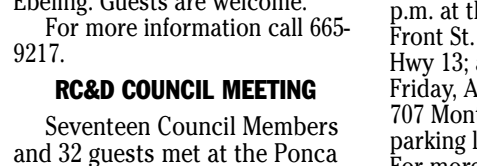
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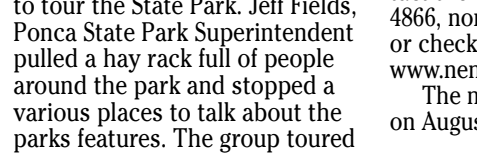
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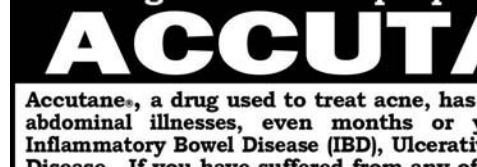
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## 3rd Annual YSD Foundation Golf Tournament A Success
