equipment throughout the district, but we just didn't have the capacity to do it," he added. "This space gives us the room and, more importantly, the proper wiring to do so."
The new administration building also houses storage space for student records, permanent historical documents, textbooks and the copy paper for the district that were previously stored in a shed.
However, the most significant change and savings for the district will be in the new shop and bus barn areas. The district now has the capability to house all of their vehicles indoors.
"It may not seem like a big thing, having the busses indoors," said Tony Anderson, district mechanic and bus supervisor. "But, when you have a vehicle worth \$80,000, you want to protect it as much as possible. It is my job to keep these vehicles running in good condition as long as I can. We typically replace the busses in about a 15-year cycle, and this will extend the values we see on them."

Anderson mentioned it will also help the drivers in the winter — just warm enough that they don't freeze over," Anderson said. "That will save us both time and money."
Anderson admitted he is looking forward to using the new shop as well.
"We will have three bays to work on vehicles," he said. "We also have the ability to pull through so when we are pulling a vehicle in for maintenance, we don't have to try to maneuver and push them in."
Officials recognize that many people in the district have questioned the need for the new facilities; the new administration building is significantly larger than the Grove building — 10,500 square feet compared to 3,500 square feet. However, Bietz and district superintendent Dr. Joseph Gertsema stressed, that the district did not purchase any new office equipment, and every project was a need that had been identified for the district for many years.
"I know people were concerned about the timing of this project," Bietz said. "But we did this project without raising taxes in the community. This project,

as well as the additions and renovations to Lincoln (Elementary), Stewart (Elementary) and the middle school, were all funded with capital outlay certificates."
The district utilized local firms to complete the projects as well; Mannes Architect did all the designs. Wellf Construction was the general contractor for the work done on the three schools and James Steel was the general contractor for the three buildings at the administration complex.
"We are proud that we were able to help keep people employed locally during the difficult economic times we have been seeing in Yankton," Bietz said. "We would not have been able to do any of it without the fabulous work and guidance of Chuck Turner, Warren Brenner, Monte Goeden and Tony Anderson."
With school starting for students in 19 days, the district was focused on getting everything up at full speed this week.
"We are ready to go," Bietz said. "We know it is going to get crazy busy, and we are ready for it."
An open house is being planned for the community to view the new buildings, Bietz said.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures advanced Friday on the Chicago Board of Trade.
Wheat for September delivery surged 34 cents to \$6.615 a bushel, while September corn climbed 13.5 cents to \$3.9275 a bushel and oats for September delivery rose 9.5 cents to \$2.71 a bushel. November soybeans jumped 17 cents to \$10.05 a bushel.
Meanwhile, beef and pork futures traded mostly higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.
October live cattle edged up 1.13 cents to 94.6 cents a pound; August feeder cattle were flat at \$1.1372 a pound; October lean hogs gained 0.63 cent to 78.7 cents a pound; and August pork bellies were unchanged at \$103.50 a pound.
